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PROGRESS REPORT ON THE IMPLEMENTATION OF THE ITTO BIENNIAL WORK PROGRAMME FOR 2013-2014

[Decision 2(XLVIII)] [Item 13a of the Provisional Agenda]

This document is prepared pursuant to Council Decision 2(XLVIII), which requested the Executive Director to report on the implementation status of the ITTO Biennial Work Programme (BWP) for the years 2013 and 2014. The document contains the Work Programme activities as approved in Council Decision 2(XLVIII). The columns on 'Expected SAP Outcomes' and 'SAP Indicators' have been removed to allow inclusion of the additional column on the implementation status of all activities carried out or being undertaken by the Council, the Committees and the Secretariat during the biennium. For information on the columns on 'Expected SAP Outcomes' and 'SAP Indicators' please consult the BWP 2013-2014 as approved in Council Decision 2(XLVIII).

The Biennial Work Programme (BWP) 2013-2014 as approved in Council Decision 2(XLVIII) includes fifty-four activities grouped in accordance with the strategic priorities identified in the ITTO Strategic Action Plan 2013-2018 plus routine, administrative and financial activities. The activities are under the responsibility of the Council, the Committees and the Secretariat, including sixteen activities under 'regular session's work' with no cost implications, five activities funded from core budget, one activity funded by programme support (Activity 36, Expert Panel), one activity (Activity 26) funded by the TMT Thematic Programme and 31 activities seeking voluntary contributions.

The total funding sought under the BWP 2013-2014 was US\$9,766,590. This total includes the funding for IMM and additional funding of US\$ 330.000 sought for the implementation of the ITTO Knowledge Management Action Plan prepared under Activity 22. The funding is divided into US\$ 1,241,254 from the core budget, US\$ 280,000 from programme support, US\$ 15,626 from unearmarked funds, US\$ 20,000 from the Bali Partnership fund (for Activity 54) and US\$ 8,209,710 from voluntary contributions (see Table 1).

Out of the thirty-one activities seeking voluntary contributions, three (9.67%) have received full funding, fifteen (48.4%) have received partial funding and thirteen (41.9%) remain unfunded. None of the activities proposed under Strategic Priority 2 have received any funding.

Status, Progress, Achievements:

Below a brief compilation of the progress made and achievements of activities that have received full or partial funding. For more details please refer to the respective activity in the Progress Report

Strategic Priority 1: Promote good governance and enabling policy frameworks for strengthening SFM and related trade and enhancing SFM financing and investment

Under this priority, three activities have been approved, all seeking voluntary contributions. One activity has received full funding, one activity has received partial funding and one activity remains unfunded (see Tables 2 & 3).

Activity 2 has commenced in Indonesia with partial funding received. An NGO, The Natural Resource Development Center (NRDC) has been selected as Executing Agency. NRDC is in the process of negotiating the implementation of the credit scheme with a lending bank, i.e. Agro BRI Bank. Two to three SFMEs in the Ciamis District of the West Java Province will be the first credit recipients.

Under Activity 3 the Meeting of the Congo Basin Forest Partnership (CBFP) was convened on 2-3 December 2013, at the Okoume Palace Hotel, Libreville, Gabon. The Meeting was organized by the Government of the United States of America in collaboration with other partners. Among other topics, the meeting provided for fruitful discussions on 'Developing Conservation-based Economic Opportunities: Framing the Issues – Ingredients for Success'. Proceedings of the meeting are available from the CBFP website.

Strategic Priority 2: Increase the contribution of tropical forests to national and local economies including through international trade

Under this priority, four activities have been approved, all seeking voluntary contributions. The four activities remain unfunded (see Tables 2 & 3).

Strategic Priority 3: Enhance conservation and sustainable use of biodiversity in tropical timber producing countries

Under this priority, two activities have been approved, both seeking voluntary contributions. One activity has received partial funding and one activity remains unfunded (see Tables 2 & 3).

Activity 8 continues to assist members to implement CITES listings of timber species. The ITTO-CITES cooperation will be presented to the Council under Item 10 of the provisional agenda, Document ITTC(L)/6

Strategic Priority 4: Reduce tropical deforestation and forest degradation and enhance provision of environmental services

Under this priority, six activities have been approved, all seeking voluntary contributions. Four activities have received partial funding and two activities remain unfunded (see Tables 2 & 3).

Under Activity 10, subactivity a, a C&I workshop for new members Benin and Mali was convened in March 2014. Subactivity b has supported the ITTO review of responses to the CFRQ, including the ITTO C&I reporting format which was part of the FAO Forest Resource Assessment 2015 reporting package. The expert meeting to be convened under subactivity b has been tentatively scheduled for late 2014, early 2015 following the approval of the revised ITTO SFM Guidelines.

Under Activity 12, the International Forum on Payments for Environmental Services of Tropical Forests was co-organized with the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations (FAO), and Costa Rica's National Fund for Forest Finance (FONAFIFO) and hosted by the Government of Costa Rica in San José, Costa Rica, on 7–10 April 2014. Based on the insights gained at the Forum, a policy brief entitled "Rewarding

the service providers" has been prepared and widely distributed. The ITTO Tropical Forest Update features discussions of the International Forum on PES as a special edition (Volume 23 Number 1 2014). The outcomes of the Forum were presented at a FAO/ITTO joint side event during FAO's 22nd Session of the Committee on Forestry (23-27 June 2014, Rome, Italy). It is also expected that the outcomes of the International Forum on PES will be presented at side events at the IUCN World Parks Congress 2014 (12-19 November, Sydney, Australia) and ITTC-50.

Under Activity 14, in consultation with IUCN/GPFLR the best knowledge and practices in forest landscape restoration were collected in Ghana for Africa, Indonesia for Asia-Pacific and Mexico for Latin. MoUs with IUCN are pending review for a) consolidation of the findings in support of the establishment of a network of learning sites and b) preparation of outreach and communication materials based on the studies

Under Activity 15, Sub-activity b, meetings were attended and financial assistance was provided for the participation of three members from the Africa, Asia, and Latin America Regional Wildland Fire Networks at meetings in preparation for the 6th International Wildland Fire Conference to be held in 2015 in South Korea.

Strategic Priority 5: Improve the quality and availability of information on tropical forests, forest product markets and trade

Under this priority, eleven activities have been approved. Five activities are funded from core budget and one activity (Activity 26) is funded under the TMT Thematic Programme. One activity (Activity 20) has sub-activities funded from the core budget and from voluntary contributions (partially funded). The remaining four activities are seeking voluntary contributions and one has received full funding, one has received partial funding and two remain unfunded.

The activities supported by the core budget include:

Activity 16: Publication of the ITTO Tropical Forest Update (TFU)

Activity 17: Preparation and conduct of the Annual Market Discussion in collaboration with the Trade Advisory Group (TAG)

Activity 18: Publication of the ITTO Tropical Timber Market Report under the Market Information Service (MIS) Activity 19: Support to Enhance and Improve the ITTO statistical work and databases

Activity 20: Support for ITTO outreach activities

Activity 21: Conduct of the Biennial Review and Assessment of the World Timber Situation

All above activities have been fully implemented. Under Activity 20 several technical reports have been published, co-published and disseminated, including:

- · Governing the forests: an institutional analysis of REDD+ and community forest management in Asia;
- Riding out the storm (TS-41);
- Towards a development strategy for the wood-processing industry in the Congo Basin;
- Indicating progress: uses and impacts of criteria and indicators for sustainable forest management (TS-42);
- Report on Environmental Product Declaration on meranti plywood in Indonesia and Malaysia
- Rewarding the service providers

Also under Activity 20 and in close coordination with Activity 22 (Knowledge Management) the redevelopment and improvement of the ITTO website and the synchronization & integration of the different ITTO web-based systems (e.g. OLMS, project database) are ongoing. A company has been selected and at the time of preparation of this report, activities have commenced. The effort also includes the development of a project search function, which has been released on the ITTO website in September 2014 and is now operational. Also, the new electronic newsletter 'Tropical Forest News' has been launched in 2014 and so far 3 issues have been published and circulated. New outreach materials such as posters and brochures highlighting the work of ITTO have been produced or are in preparation.

Following the presentation and approval of the report prepared under Activity 22 follow-up funding of US\$ 245.000 was pledged for the implementation of the Knowledge Management Strategy and Action Plan. While the main focus in 2014 has been on the re-examination of the ITTO information infrastructure and the

redevelopment of the ITTO website, the activity has also supported efforts to improve project learning, networking, and knowledge use and sharing, including the preparation and dissemination of the policy brief 'Rewarding the service providers' under Activity 12 and the publication of the 'Technical guide on the quantification of carbon benefits in ITTO projects' (Red-PA 069/11 Rev.1 (F)). A synthesis of the aggregated achievements of the ITTO Thematic Programmes on REDDES and TFLET towards the programmatic objectives is ongoing and the report is expected in December 2014.

The study on Environmental Product Declarations under Activity 23 is ongoing. The study for meranti plywood in Malaysia and Indonesia has been completed and the report can be downloaded from ITTO's homepage. The studies on khaya lumber in Ghana and ipe decking in Brazil are ongoing with the reports expected in early 2015.

While the funding of US\$300,000 requested under Activity 25 was not provided for the originally formulated activity, the objectives of the IMM and the establishment of a web site to report on its outputs are closely linked to the objectives of the original work proposed under this activity and therefore the IMM project was included under this BWP activity. In January 2014 a contract was signed between the EU and ITTO to undertake independent market monitoring (IMM) of FLEGT-licensed timber entering the EU market, providing for a four million euro grant from the EU over the period 2014-2018 (additional 375,000 euros will be provided as an ITTO in-kind contribution to the project over this period). US\$ 13,800 of the funds was allocated to the fundraising work under Activity 54 of this BWP.

The final report of Activity 26 to analyze the economic impact of governmental procurement (funded under the Thematic Programme on Trade and Market Transparency) has been revised taking into account member comments. It will be considered at the Forty-eighth session of the Committee on Economics, Statistics and Markets (CEM) and the Committee on Forest Industry (CFI).

Strategic Priority 6: Build and develop human resource capacity to implement SFM and increase trade in forest goods and services from sustainably managed forests

Under this priority, nine activities have been approved, all seeking voluntary contributions. Seven activities have received partial funding, while two remain unfunded.

Funded Activities under this priority include:

Activity 27: Assistance for the participation of TAG and CSAG at the 49th and 50th ITTC – completed Activity 28: ITTO involvement in UNFF and CPF – completed Activity 30: ITTO Fellowship programme. The Council will receive the report on the implementation of the Fellowship Programme under Item 18 of the provisional agenda, [Document ITTC(L)/15]

Activity 31 to strengthen the capacity to promote efficient wood processing in producer countries by means of in-house training had been initialized under the BWP 2012-2013. Training was provided to 15 industries in Mexico (9) and Guatemala (6).

Activity 33 conducted a survey involving producers, consumers and others. Based on the responses received 'support to the development and marketing of value-added products' and 'more information on lesser-used timber species (LUS)' are the topics of major importance for the transfer of technology and know-how. A dedicated webpage to make available more information on ITTO LUS knowledge is under development

Under Activity 34 one statistical workshop was held in Haikou, Hainan, China from 1-3 April 2013 and a regional workshop for the Asia-Pacific region was held in Kunming, China, 17-19 September 2014. Both workshops were convened in collaboration with FAO and under ITTO's cooperation agreement with APFNet. Proceedings of the Hainan Workshop are available from the ITTO Secretariat and the ITTO website. Proceedings of the second workshop are in preparation. A survey undertaken in 2014 by the Chinese Academy of Forestry of plywood factories included 308 enterprises in 21 provinces. Preliminary data were received in September 2014 and the final report is expected in early 2015. The summary report of the

workshop in Kunming is expected in October 2014.

Under Activity 35 and based on Decision 4(XLIX), the revised ITTO Voluntary Guidelines for the Sustainable Management of Natural Tropical Forest have been adopted through the electronic no-objection procedure.

Routine, Administrative and Financial Activities

Under this category, nineteen activities have been approved, including sixteen activities under 'regular sessions work', one activity funded from Programme Support in 2013 and the Core Administrative Budget in 2014 (Activity 36, Expert Panel) and two activities seeking voluntary contributions. Out of the latter one activity has received full funding and one activity remains unfunded.

Under Activity 36, the Forty-fifth, Forty-sixth, Forty-seventh and Forty-eighth Expert Panels have been convened in Yokohama, Japan on 4 - 8 February 2013, 29 July – 2 August 2013, 3 – 7 February 2014 and 4 – 8 August 2014 respectively. The reports of the Expert Panel for 2014 will be presented to the Joint Session of the Committees under Item 1 of its provisional agenda.

Under Activity 54 the Committee of Finance and Administration (CFA) will receive the report of the Working Group on Mobilizing New Funding and Partnerships for ITTO and its Objectives under Item 11 of its Provisional Agenda.

Summary of the contribution of BWP activities to the expected outcomes of the ITTO Strategic Action Plan 2013-2018:

Strategic Priority 1: Promote good governance and enabling policy frameworks for strengthening SFM and related trade and enhancing SFM financing and investment

Activity 2 is contributing towards better managed forest sector with increased access to financing and investments. (Indicator: Resources for implementations of SFM)

Strategic Priority 2: Increase the contribution of tropical forests to national and local economies including through international trade

No funding has been pledged under this priority

Strategic Priority 3: Enhance the conservation and sustainable use of biodiversity in tropical timber producing forests

Activity 8 is contributing to 'Trade and utilization of timber and non-timber tropical forest species that is consistent with their conservation'. (Indicator: Number of commercial timber species and non-timber tropical forest species listed in CITES)

Strategic Priority 4: Reduce tropical deforestation and forest degradation and enhance provision of environmental services

The activities funded are contributing towards "Financial support for SFM is increased by payments for environmental services of tropical forests' and 'Increase in the area of forest under SFM and use of ITTO guidelines and C&I (Indicator(s): Number of countries with initiatives in place for payments of environmental services or similar mechanisms)

Strategic Priority 5: Improve the quality and availability of information on tropical forests, forest product markets and trade

The activities have addressed and contributed to all expected outcomes of Strategic Priority 5. The activities are contributing to provision of timely and more accurate data, better accessibility of ITTO data(bases) and it is expected that this will lead to an increase in the number of countries/stakeholders using this information for policy, market development and investment promotion (and other purposes). The full scale of improvements in terms of quality and availability of information is not yet assessable as the technical re-development of the website and the synchronization and harmonization of IT infrastructure is just starting at the time this report is prepared.

Strategic Priority 6: Build and develop human resource capacity to implement SFM and increase trade in forest goods and services from sustainably managed forests

Capacity building has been provided through the ITTO Fellowship Programme, in-house training and workshops assisting member countries in terms of statistics and improved reporting. ITTO knowledge on lesser-used species will be made available through a new dedicated webpage currently under development. Support provided to TAG and CSAG is aiming at better collaboration between private sector and civil society. The approval of the revised ITTO Guidelines for the Sustainable Management of Natural Tropical Forest is contributing to Strategic Priority 4.

Major Difficulties Encountered:

For those activities which have received full or partial funding, no major difficulties have been encountered. The funding for some activities has though been received late so that the activities could not be completed by the time this report has been prepared.

The major difficulty encountered under the BWP 2013-2014 is the substantial number of activities with only partial or no funding. The 54 activities proposed and approved in Council Decision 2(XLVIII) under this BWP, include 31 activities seeking voluntary contributions. Only three activities or 9.7% have received full funding, fifteen or 48.4% have received partial funding and thirteen or 41.9% remain unfunded. Out of the total voluntary contributions of US\$ \$8,209,710 sought under this BWP, US\$3,170,081 or 38.6% have been received.

Notably, none of the four activities proposed under Strategic Priority 2 'Increase the contribution of tropical forests to national and local economies, including through international trade' has received any funding.

Out of eighteen activities proposed by the ITTO Technical Divisions and under responsibility of the Technical Committees only one has received full funding, eight have received partial funding, while nine remain unfunded.
