# Report to the Chairperson of Council submitted by the Oversight Committee extended under Decision 2(LI.1) to oversee the implementation of ITTC Decision 4(LI)

### A. Introduction

The Oversight Committee (OC) has previously submitted a report and addendum to the Chairperson of the Council in accordance with Decision 4(LI). Both reports were circulated to members on 15 April 2016 and 10 June 2016 and can be read or downloaded from http://www.itto.int/files/user/documents/OC\_Reports.zip using the password that the Secretariat provided to all official country contact points through official email communication. Due to the sensitivity of the information provided in the reports, they are password protected. Council members are requested to respect the confidentiality of these reports, with the knowledge that the information contained within the reports should be used and shared solely with individuals involved with official ITTO business.

These reports indicated that ITTO was by mid-2016 facing a potential loss of a total of US\$18.2 million from failed investments and that the gravity of the situation would require Council to take some immediate difficult decisions to remedy the situation and reestablish the financial credibility of the ITTO.

As a result, four such decisions were approved by Council without meeting in July 2016:

- 1. Decision 1(LI.1): Revision of ITTO Financial Rules And Procedures, Audit Standards, and Relevant Staff Regulations and Rules
- Decision 2(LI.1): Extension of The Mandate of The Oversight Committee Established Under Decision 4(LI)
- 3. Decision 3(LI.1): Management of The Administrative Budget For 2016
- 4. Decision 4(LI.1): Legal Measures Related To ITTO Investments

This report summarizes the work of the OC under Decision 2(LI.1).

The original composition of the OC changed as follows under Decision 2(LI.1):

- 1. Mr. Cornelius Kabagat (PNG) resigned but no new nomination to replace him was received from the producer caucus.
- Mr. Robert Nyarko (Ghana) was replaced by Mr. Nurudeen Idrissu (Ghana) at the request of Mr. Tabi Agyarko (Ghana, Vice-chairperson of the Council) and in consultation with the producer spokesperson.

The remainder of the members of the OC as listed in its previous reports continued unchanged under Decision 2(LI.1) as follows:

All members of the OC (with the exception of the co-chairs, who served in their capacity as Chair and Vice-Chair of the Committee on Finance and Administration) served in their personal expert capacities. The OC's working modalities continued to be through teleconferences and electronic mail. As per the provisions of Decision 2(LI.1), the Chairperson and Vice-chairperson of the Council were invited to participate in all OC teleconferences which were facilitated by the ITTO Secretariat and were held on:

- 1. 5 September 2016
- 2. 4 October 2016
- 3. 13 October 2016
- 4. 20 October 2016

Note: All members/observers participated in all calls with the exception of the Vice-chairperson of Council who was unable to participate in any of the calls.

The terms of reference (TOR) of the extended OC were defined in Decision 2(LI.1) as:

- 1. Develop strategies for prioritizing projects and managing impacts of the loss of project funds;
- 2. Follow, advise, and report on evolving legal issues;
- 3. Provide advice and comments on proposals for amending the financial and administrative rules;
- 4. Oversee and facilitate the implementation of other Decisions taken by Council without meeting, and the preparation of draft Decisions for consideration by Council at ITTC52;
- 5. Investigate the incentives that led ITTO's previous management to seek additional funds for the Organization through the above investments;
- 6. Provide ongoing advice and guidance, as relevant, to the Chairperson of Council, the IAG, or the Secretariat; and
- 7. Submit report(s) to the Chairperson of Council, at her request.

This report is submitted by the OC to the Chairperson of Council in accordance with its TOR and deals with each of the first five items above in turn. In regard to the sixth item, advice and guidance has been provided to the Chair and the Secretariat by the OC since its establishment, as described by its mandate.

### B. Strategies for prioritizing projects and managing impacts of the loss of project funds

Drafting of the attached draft decision (Annex 1) accounted for the majority of the OC's time during its extended mandate. The OC is grateful to Mr. Malleux and Mr. Thompson for their efforts to lead the drafting process.

The list of impacted projects that the decision is attempting to deal with is contained in Annex 4 (note Table 4.3 of Annex 4 includes funds pledged by donors at or after ITTC 51 which have been safeguarded until those donors make a final decision on their allocation; these safeguarded funds are not part of the strategy for dealing with the loss of project funds). The draft decision envisages that the total amount to be spent on impacted on-going projects/activities will be reduced by measures which include:

- efforts by the Secretariat to further minimize the costs;
- consultations with various parties concerned (above all donors, and the parties in recipient countries); and
- consideration of recommendation for terminating projects that had not started at least two years after they were approved by Council, as well as all Biennial Work Programme activities that are not yet the subject of contractual commitments.

The draft decision requests donors with unallocated funds (such as the surplus from completed projects) to use these funds to help impacted projects, while urging all members to consider contributing additional resources in whatever capacity possible.

The draft decision further authorizes the Executive Director to utilize internal reserves of up to \$9.4 million to compensate the loss of funds. Due to the exceptional situation this amount includes \$4.16 million to be drawn from resources of the Administrative Account.

Finally, in order to fill the gap which may remain after mobilizing the above options, as an ultimate option, the draft decision requests the Executive Director to apply a "haircut" of a defined, equal portion to remaining projects/activities that are not treated as liabilities on ITTO's balance sheet. Thus this should allow sufficient funds to be brought to bear from the sources mentioned in the draft decision to allow all other projects that countries remain interested in implementing to be completed while still achieving their main objectives. Note that Council may need to review the resources available to implement this proposed solution at its 53<sup>rd</sup> Session since some of the funds can only be used to address the impairments with the consent of donors which may or may not be forthcoming. In particular some of the funds provided by donors are the subject of

detailed contracts between ITTO and the donor which need to be respected, not least because they are based on the Financial Regulations governing the donor.

The list by donor of the maximum potential losses of funds committed for projects/activities as of the end of August is contained in Annex 3. It is important to note that in the case of on-going projects/activities that are restarted under the terms of the draft decision, if it is approved, the amount of money at risk will be reduced by spending that takes place once those on-going projects/activities are unfrozen. In many of those cases the final loss will only be equivalent to the amount of efficiency savings plus the 'hair-cut' and most of the expected project results will be achieved. It is also the case that where the project is protected by a specific donor contract, contracted funds cannot be the subject of a hair-cut but will instead be used on eligible expenditure under the contract or as agreed with the donor.

### C. Legal issues

#### Investment Advisor

- Under Decision 4(LI.1) legal proceedings against the investment advisor who sold the products that led to the loss of ITTO funds were initiated through ITTO's lawyers. The first court proceedings will take place on November 10 (during ITTC 52). ITTO's lawyers have advised that it will be a preliminary hearing and that there is no need for the Secretariat to participate. The Secretariat intends to attend any subsequent court sessions.
- As part of the legal process, ITTO succeeded in getting a court order freezing a bank account of the
  investment advisor. While the account only had a small balance (which ITTO was only entitled to
  know once the process was completed), the action should have captured the advisor's attention and
  made it more likely that he will answer the summons to the court proceedings on November 10. The
  security deposit for the court order was approximately US\$30,000 which will be returned to ITTO if
  the court rules in its favor.
- Both the Secretariat and the host government representative have made reports to Japan's Financial Services Agency (FSA) regarding the conduct of the investment advisor in this case. The reports were well received, and both the Secretariat and the host government are waiting for the formal reaction from the FSA.

#### LM Fund liquidation

- There has been no new information on the liquidation of the LM Fund since the only additional report to investors since the previous OC reports again stated that very little was left and if anything was recovered, it would be used to meet the costs of the liquidators.
- Since the initial estimate of a return of 5 cents/US\$ was over-optimistic, the full amount of the LM investment was written off in the 2014 audit. This was made explicit in the revised 2014 audit report which was sent to members together with the 2015 audit.

#### Ardent Fund liquidation

- The liquidation process was started with the appointment of a voluntary liquidator in the Cayman Islands, by the former fund management company Blackstar. ITTO tried to appoint its own trustees, based on advice received from lawyers in Barbados where Ardent was originally set up, but it emerged that Ardent had shifted its registered office to the Cayman Islands which made the appointment of trustees more complicated.
- The Blackstar appointed liquidators went to the High Court in the Cayman Islands and obtained an order against ITTO to cease and desist in trying to put in place its own trustee stating that any trustee put in place by an individual investor would endanger the rights of all investors. ITTO was not involved in the court case in the Cayman Islands and was not notified in time to be represented there.
- The lawyers in Barbados continued to insist that ITTO could win the case on appointing trustees and that action should be taken against the court order in the Cayman Islands, but the Officer-in-Charge decided against it as ITTO was continuing to incur legal fees in Barbados and in the Cayman Islands.
- Subsequently ITTO received a bill from the liquidator's lawyers amounting to US\$97,000. So far the Secretariat has refused to pay that bill, rejecting the premises on which it is based and quoting ITTO's immunity against any kind of seizure of ITTO assets in Japan under its Headquarters Agreement. The Ardent liquidators continue trying to collect the amount, threatening ITTO with

contempt of court. Council will need to decide if it wishes ITTO to pay the bill for the liquidator's lawyers.

- There was a teleconference on the Ardent liquidation process with ITTO participation in September. Minutes of the teleconference have been received but are covered by a non-disclosure agreement. The liquidators reported that they had concentrated on launching a lawsuit against the RMP and Bruin factoring companies in the USA, who they are blamed for fraudulent activities. They also explained that they had not been able to have the companies appear in court and that they might in fact just be shell companies.
- ITTO strongly urged the liquidators to initiate criminal procedures and to try to investigate the role of Mr. Jeffrey Lipton who established Ardent, given that he had been involved in previous fraudulent fund situations like this. The liquidators did not respond to this recommendation and strongly rejected police involvement despite ITTO's and other investors' calls for this.
- The liquidators have repeatedly reported that there is no money left in the Ardent Fund to cover their costs and the main purpose of the call (and subsequent efforts to get ITTO to pay their legal costs) was to convince the investors to provide additional funding to the liquidators to carry out their work.
- Based on advice from the Barbados lawyers and discussions with other investors that participated in the teleconference, the Secretariat, in consultation with ITTO's US contact point, took the initiative to contact the FBI and US Department of Justice about this case, provided them with all relevant facts and asked whether the US authorities believed that this could constitute a violation of US law; to date there has been no response.
- All indications are that there will be no return of any of ITTO's investment in the Ardent funds.

### Other legal issues

Council may wish to consider whether there is merit in further civil action against any of the involved parties (in particular, any civil claims against former employees, i.e. the ED and his staff) and/or consider other sanctions that may be applicable to any of these parties. In making an informed decision, the Council will need to balance the reputation, standards of conduct and legal rights of ITTO and in particular its role as a custodian of resources given for projects, with the likely tangible costs and benefits of action.

In the case of the former employees, particular consideration will need to be given to the fact that the individuals concerned are currently retired and living outside Japanese jurisdiction. Moreover, ITTO has no role in paying their pensions since their shares of the Provident Fund held in a commercial company were paid to them, in accordance with the current Staff Regulations, when their employment ended.

The Council may, however, consider possible measures including acknowledgement of the apology letter by the former Executive Director and requesting voluntary compensation by former staff members in line with the new Staff Regulations that are expected to be adopted by Council at its 52<sup>nd</sup> Session. In addition, it should be noted that by implementing a procedure called "third-party notice" under the on-going civil proceedings against the investment advisor, it is possible to suspend Japan's statute of limitations for any possible future civil action the Council may decide to initiate against the former employees or other parties. The Council may wish to request the Executive Director to take the necessary steps for this purpose.

In the case of the auditors, the Committee received professional advice that the work was done in accordance with the terms of reference set for the 2013 and 2014 audits. The Expert Panel on the revision of ITTO's Financial Rules has addressed the matter of Auditing Standards.

### D. Amendment of financial/administrative rules

The OC was regularly updated on work to amend the relevant ITTO rules under the terms of Decision 1(LI.1) and benefited from having one of its members (Ms. Hanna, EU) participating in the Expert Panel established under that Decision. This allowed for excellent synergies between the work of the OC and that of the Expert Panel amending the rules. The consultants who prepared the background document which served as the basis for the Expert Panel's work and recommendations also consulted closely with members of the OC. The report of the Expert Panel that considered the revision of relevant ITTO rules is contained in Council document ITTC(LII)/11(b) together with relevant draft decisions.

# E. Implementation of Decisions without meeting, and preparation of draft Decisions for ITTC52

The OC was regularly updated on the implementation of the decisions listed in the Introduction to this report. Details on the first decision (revision of rules) and the last (legal measures) have been summarized above. The second decision (extension of OC mandate) is self-explanatory, while the third, approving use of the

Working Capital Reserve for administrative expenses in 2016, proved unnecessary since enough members subsequently paid their 2016 administrative budget contributions.

Non-procedural decisions foreseen at ITTC 52 related to the work of the OC include the draft decision in Annex 1 and at least two from the Expert Panel on revision of relevant ITTO rules (approving amendments to staff and financial rules). There may also be (depending on deliberations of Council) a decision on additional civil action or other sanctions on parties involved in the loss of ITTO funds which could incorporate the recommendations set out in the 2<sup>nd</sup> to 4<sup>th</sup> bullet points in the conclusions below. The OC recognized that the Informal Advisory Group would make final proposals on these and other potential decisions to be considered at ITTC 52.

### F. Incentives for seeking additional funds through investments

The OC considered what may have motivated former staff members to try to grow the Organization's funds by making the kind of investments that led to catastrophic losses for ITTO. It concluded that the only possibilities were illicit arrangements with the investment advisor (for which the independent investigation in the first half of 2016 had found no evidence) and/or a desire to try to raise money to finance more approved ITTO projects/activities that were awaiting funding. The OC suggested that the Expert Panel considering amendments to ITTO's financial and relevant staff rules take these possible motivations into account.

### G. Recommendations

The OC recommends that the ITTC:

- Adopt a decision at its 52<sup>nd</sup> Session based on the draft contained in Annex 1 following due consideration and possible amendment.
- Decide on the desirability, reputational benefits and likely financial costs and benefits of taking additional action with respect to former employees (i.e. the former Executive Director and his staff).
- Request the Executive Director, without prejudice to any legal recourse that ITTO may have, to invite the former employees, without any declaration of liability, to contribute to meeting the financial shortfall, including by returning to the Organization its contributions to their Provident Funds.
- Confirm that no action should be taken against the external auditors with respect to their audit reports on the ITTO 2013 and 2014 Financial Statements.
- Confirm that no payment should be made for legal expenses associated with the liquidation of the Ardent funds, taking into account ITTO's immunity from any attempt to enforce payment under its Headquarters Agreement with the government of Japan.

#### ANNEX 1

#### DECISION ...(LII) GUIDELINES FOR ADDRESSING ITTO FINANCIAL SHORTFALL

The International Tropical Timber Council,

<u>Welcoming</u> the ongoing work of the Oversight Committee pursuant to decisions 4(LI) and 2(LI.1) in providing advice to the Chair, Secretariat, and IAG to address financial losses, including issuance of this decision;

<u>Recalling</u> the loss of \$18.2 million USD in ITTO funding due to the failure of investments as described in the Oversight Committee Report and Addendum delivered pursuant to decision 4(LI);

Noting that as a result of the financial losses the ITTO Special Account and the Bali Partnership Fund no longer contain sufficient funds to fulfill outstanding ITTO commitments to on-going technical projects and activities of the organization (\$14.2M), and donor refunds due from completed projects (\$3.8M);

<u>Acknowledging</u> the need for a fair and transparent process to allocate limited resources to outstanding commitments;

<u>Recognizing</u> that the financial losses have impacts on all of the ITTO membership and that any solution needs to provide sufficient flexibility to enable the Executive Director and the ITTO Secretariat to effectively address the financial shortfall;

<u>Further recognizing</u> that the recent audit of ITTO accounts and associated work by the Secretariat allowed the closure of several past projects and identification of extra reserves in other accounts, providing the possibility of drawing upon the reserves in other ITTO accounts as described in the report of the extended Oversight Committee under the provisions of Decision 2(LI.1);

<u>Welcoming</u> the efforts that the Secretariat has already undertaken to minimize administrative and project costs, and the need for its continuous efforts to achieve even further savings through efficiencies in project management and administration as far as possible;

<u>Acknowledging</u> that even with all reserves from other accounts that may be applied to the funding gap, ITTO will still have a shortfall in meeting outstanding commitments and that cost saving measures, closure of some projects, and prioritization of activities will need to occur;

<u>Seeking</u> partnership, solidarity and understanding from both producer and consumer members in the face of likely budget limitations and the need to write off relevant approved project expenses as per the terms of this Decision;

<u>Reiterating</u> the desire to immediately resume the operation of all projects/activities without significant impacts on their expected results/outputs;

### Decides to:

- 1. Request the Executive Director to apply the following guidelines to projects and activities pledged before ITTC51, in a fair and transparent manner, in addressing the financial shortfall:
- Minimize administrative and project costs as far as possible to achieve further savings through efficiencies in project management and administration;
- Ensure that project expenses already legitimately incurred by implementing agencies and/or treated as liabilities in ITTO's accounts, including ITTO's contractual obligations to donors, are met as expeditiously as possible;
- Consult with donors;
- Consult with executing agencies, country contact points, project managers and regional officers on the recommencement of impacted projects/activities, making all savings possible in the budgets of these projects;
- Take into account the desirability of balancing impacts between geographic regions and diversity of project activities
- Consider recommending projects for termination that have not started for at least two years following funding, provided that the donor(s) to the projects thus terminated must approve of any use of funds thus derived from termination; and
- Close, scale back, or postpone selected activities of the Biennial Work Programme 2015-2016, except activities for which contracts have been signed governing their implementation, which do not have sufficient funds for their completion, or which are not considered to be a priority for 2017 under the extension of the 2015-2016 BWP [adopted in Decision XX (LII)] and provided the donor(s) to the activities must approve of any use of funds thus derived;
- 2. Request donors with unallocated funds in ITTO's accounts to use these funds in so far as possible to help to address the funding shortfall;
- 3. Urge all members to consider contributing additional resources to address the financial shortfall, be it through voluntary contributions, in kind resources to projects and activities, or other means;
- 4. Authorize the Executive Director to utilize the following amounts to be applied to assist in meeting the shortfall of funds:
- Up to a maximum of \$5.24 million from the following reserves of the Special Account and Bali Partnership Fund:
  - Unearmarked Funds and Bali Partnership Fund Sub-Account B (up to \$2.80 million)
  - Thematic Programme Pooled Account (up to \$0.84 million)
  - Programme Support fund (up to \$0.8 million)
  - Ex-post Pooled fund (up to \$0.8 million)
- As an extraordinary measure and to indicate the shared commitment of members to addressing this problem, up to a maximum of \$4.16 million from the reserves of the Administrative Account:
  - Reserve provided by Administrative Account interest income excluding interest income under Dec 2 (XXXIV) (up to \$1.66 million)
  - Working Capital Reserve (up to \$2.50 million) while retaining sufficient funds in the Reserve to comply with the Financial Rules;
- 5. Request the Executive Director to consult with implementing agencies on possible cost saving measures in remaining projects/activities, including administering a proportionate cut across all remaining projects and activities as the most immediate, fair and transparent solution for ensuring the resumption of the maximum number of projects/activities possible;
- 6. Confirm that no payment is due with respect to the demands made to date by the liquidators of the Ardent funds, taking into account ITTO's Headquarters Agreement with the government of Japan;
- 7. Request the Executive Director to provide transparent, detailed reporting to the Council on how the provisions of this Decision have been applied, including a preliminary report within three months of the adoption of the Decision and an annual summary report at ITTC53.

#### Notes

- The total amount of impacted project/activity payments outstanding is approximately \$14.2 million. This does not include approximately \$2.6 million of pledges to projects/activities by Japan and the USA at ITTC 51 or later for which no contracts have been entered into yet (Project/Activity Committed/Safeguarded Funds in part 2 of Annex 2). These funds have been tentatively earmarked to the originally pledged projects/activities, but a final decision will be at the discretion of the donor(s).
- 2. All funds shown in part 2 of Annex 2 will require donor authorization for release. The options available to donors for allocating these funds are as follows:
  - a. Allocate to projects/activities to which the donor has already made a pledge(if applicable)
  - b. Allocate to new projects/activities
  - c. Allocate to impacted projects/activities
  - d. Leave funds in Donors' Funds account (unallocated)
  - e. Request funds to be refunded.

The bulk of the total figure of \$3.61 million shown in part 2 belongs to Japan (72%) and the USA (21%). These two donors also account for the majority of the total impacts to donors (64% and 7%, respectively) shown in Annex 3 as a result of the lost investments of ITTO funds. Those impacts include potential refunds due from completed projects that will need to be written off. The right of these and other donors to decide how to use their funds is recognized in operative paragraph 2 of the draft decision.

- 3. The \$14.2 million of impacted project/activity payments includes approximately \$1.1 million of Biennial Work Program 2015-16 activities which were funded but which have no outstanding commitments or contracts governing their implementation (workshops and other activities to be convened by Secretariat, etc). These activities could seek additional funding from donors if the 2015-16 BWP is extended or under the 2018-19 BWP to be approved at ITTC 53. In addition, there are three projects with combined ITTO budgets of approximately \$0.9 million for which contracts were signed over 2 years ago but where implementation has not commenced due to various problems in the countries/agencies that proposed them. The Secretariat will propose that the contracts signed for these projects be voided under the sunset provision of ITTO's project rules or that the projects be terminated. If these two actions (as provided for in the draft decision) are taken, and their respective donors agree to funding reallocation pursuant to operative paragraph 1 and 2 of the draft decision, the remaining impacted project/activity payments may be reduced to approximately \$12 million.
- 4. If the Secretariat is able to negotiate an agreed standard reduction in the approved budgets of the remaining projects/activities, that will result in a further "savings". For example, an agreed reduction of 10-20% would "save" approximately \$1.2-\$2.4 million of project/activity costs. That will leave a total impacted balance of project payments of around \$10-11 million. This is approaching the amount available under parts 1 and 2 of Annex 2, assuming that all of the amount in part 1 and the Donors' funds under part 2 of Annex 2 are made available (total of \$8.8 million). The balance could be made up from amounts to be made available from the Programme support and Ex-post pooled fund, shown in part 3 of Annex 2 (e.g. up to \$0.8 million from each). Any need for additional resources/savings on projects/activities could be addressed at ITTC 53 when Council would have a detailed report from the ED on the implementation of the draft decision including responses from donors.
