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DRAFT ITTO BIENNIAL WORK PROGRAMME FOR 2024-2025

[Item 12(b) of the Provisional Agenda]

Decision 9(XXXIV), adopted by the Council at its Thirty-fourth Session, requested the Executive Director to develop a Biennial Work Programme (BWP) which prioritizes and allocates resources for specific activities under the Organization's Action Plan. The Secretariat has prepared this draft BWP containing proposed activities for 2024-2025, taking into account the ITTA, 2006, the ITTO Strategic Action Plan 2022-2026 (SAP), the Progress Report on the Implementation of the ITTO Biennial Work Programme for 2021-2022 extended into 2023 [Document ITTC(LVI)/7]. All proposed activities are continued or build on work undertaken through an activity in the previous BWP.

With a view to provide a coherent structure to the activities under the BWP, the proposed activities have been categorized according to their nature, with separate categories for Group 1 – Field Oriented Activities with Engagement of/Work In Member Countries; Group 2 – Normative Work on Policy Guidelines or Other Strategic Work; Group 3 – Collaborative Work with Other Organizations/Initiatives Including Meetings; Group 4 – Communications and Outreach Related Work; Group 5 – Analytical, Statistical; and Other Recurring Work and Financial and Administrative Activities having no financial requirements. In order to link the BWP to the relevant overarching goals of ITTO and the global community, each activity from Groups 1-5 contains a reference to the strategic priority(ies) it would contribute to under the SAP, as well as which global forest goals (and thus which sustainable development goals) it would contribute to under the UN Strategic Plan on Forests (UNSPF). Under Decision 8(LV) 'Implementing ITTO's New Financing Architecture – Phase I', the new ITTO Programmatic Approach and Programme Lines were approved for a pilot phase from 2020-2022 and extended through 2024 following discussions at ITTC58, with a review report to be presented at the ITTC 60 in 2024. As the modalities for the implementation of the new approach are still under development, a number of activities that will directly fall under the Programme Lines have been included under this BWP and an additional reference to the respective Programme Line has been included for those activities.

A reference table is provided with descriptions of the Strategic Priorities (SP), Global Forest Goals (GFG) and Programme Lines (PL).

The Annex to the draft BWP contains the Terms of Reference for the proposed activities that require financing (i.e. Groups 1-5), providing background information, description of activities, expected outcomes, duration and target countries/regions involved. Information on implementation approach and estimated costs are included indicating expected budgetary requirements.

The proposed activities together with the project work under the ITTO regular project cycle and ITTO Programme Lines will contribute towards achieving the expected outcomes of the SAP. The implementation of the BWP will be monitored, reviewed and evaluated as part of an iterative process in formulating the Biennial Work Programme for 2026-2027. The Council may wish to consider and approve this draft BWP for 2024-25.

TERMS OF REFERENCE FOR THE ACTIVITIES IN GROUPS 1-5 OF THE BIENNIAL WORK PROGRAMME FOR THE YEARS 2024-2025

BUILDING LEGAL AND SUSTAINABLE FOREST PRODUCT SUPPLY CHAINS

I. Background

This activity will involve close collaboration with donor countries seeking to ensure legality of tropical timber imports. The activity will build on previous work by ITTO and partners to promote SFM and to establish sustainable supply chains, including through innovative timber tracking systems.

II. Description

The activity will support key exporters to respond to emerging demands from consumers for the development of green supply chains. In 2024-2025 work will be continued on the implementation of the programme on legal and sustainable supply chains (LSSC) for tropical wood and forest products. Activities will involve building the LSSC-GGSC platform; consolidating and improving the Global Timber Index (GTI) Platform to provide multi-dimensional service (Phase II&III); establishing and testing a simulation platform for cross-border timber traceability based on the blockchain technology (Phase II&III); further developing the Timber Trade Portal (TTP) website, as well as other events and activities.

ITTO will recruit an experienced team to implement this activity.

III. Expected outputs

The activity will result in tropical forest concessionaires developing increased capacity for SFM and/or sustainable supply chains together with the main private sector importers in key consumer countries. It will thereby increase trade in sustainable/legally verified timber. The activity will facilitate the construction of LSSC-GGSC platform including the improvement of the Global Timber Index (GTI) Platform to provide multi-dimensional service (Phase II&III) and the establishment of a simulation platform for cross-border timber traceability based on the blockchain technology (Phase II&III), and the further development of the Timber Trade Portal (TTP) website, as well as other events and activities. Using remaining funds under the BWP for 2021-2022 extended into 2023, the following work will continue into 2024 and 2025, including building the LSSC-GGSC platform, the improvement of the Global Timber Index (GTI) Platform to provide multi-dimensional service and the establishment of a simulation platform for cross-border timber traceability based on the blockchain technology, and the flobal Timber Index (GTI) Platform to provide multi-dimensional service and the establishment of a simulation platform for cross-border timber traceability based on the blockchain technology, and the further development of the Timber Trade Portal (TTP) website, as well as other events and activities.

STRENGTHENING PARTICIPATION OF THE PRIVATE SECTOR IN THE WORK OF ITTO: INDUSTRY-LED LEGALITY COMPLIANCE/DUE CARE TRAINING

I. Background

During the last decade, major consumer markets have put new market requirements and measures in place to restrict the entry of illegally harvested and traded wood products, most notably through the U.S. Lacey Act from 2008 and the EUTR from 2013. The recent adoption of the EUDR in 2023 adds a new layer of complexity. Industry, both corporate and small-scale suppliers, have had to substantially adjust their practices for sourcing legally and sustainable wood. In doing so, it has become apparent that a significant gap exists in how buyers and traders along the supply chain manage their practices in order to demonstrate due care. Some of the issues encountered have been a regular discussion at the CEM/CFI committee as tropical suppliers struggle to understand and meet new market requirements in consumer countries.

Several organizations have developed training programs and materials on forest legality in partnership with industry associations. For example, the Global Timber Forum,--a UK based nonprofit industry group which convenes associations of the wood-based industries and their stakeholders to address shared challenges in responsible trade-- and the FAO FLEGT program brought together groups such as International Wood Products Association of the USA, the European Timber Trade Federation and the UK Timber Trade Federation, as well as others to assess supplier country training and technical assistance needs. Curricula developed in conjunction with experts were piloted and launched in producer countries in Latin America (Colombia, Guatemala and Peru) with ITTO assistance under the 2018-20 and 2021-23 BWPs.

This ongoing work supports the ITTO SAP goals of forging alliances with the private sector, strengthening ITTO work with a major CPF Partner (FAO), and fulfills a commitment by the CEM/CFI committee to enhance work with the private sector with concrete action.

II. Description

ITTO will work with the Trade Advisory Group as well as partners like FAO (a CPF partner), together with major relevant international organizations, NGOs and private sector associations that are working in this area to pilot and scale up capacity on legality compliance/due care. The training model will follow one that has been proven successful – delivered by industry actors in partnership with respected intergovernmental and nongovernmental organizations, who understand the challenges and needs and vocabulary of businesses and industry in producer countries who are involved in the international trade. Remaining funding from the related activities under previous BWPs will be used to carry out one additional workshop in 2024-25. If additional funds are pledged under this BWP, this work will be extended to up to four additional countries in the other tropical regions.

PROMOTING QULIATY TIMBER PRODUCTION FROM SMALLHOLDER AND LOCAL COMMUNITY - ESTABLISHED PLANTATIONS

I. Background

Smallholder timber plantations in the tropics have the potential for sustainable quality timber supply chains, driven by increasing forest landscape restoration initiatives. These plantations also provide valuable ecosystem services like carbon sequestration and soil conservation, benefiting local communities. Developing smallholder agroforestry systems with teak and other valuable native tree species has a huge potential for the supply of timber to the local timber industries. Teak plantations, for example, have been widely established across 70 tropical countries over an estimated 6.89 million hectares, nearly 80% of which is in Asia followed by 10% in Africa and 6% in Latin America. Smallholder systems account for approximately one-fifth of the global teak estate and are an important source of raw material for national and international teak industries. However, their productivity remains generally low, due to poor quality of planting stock, insufficient silvicultural practices, limited financing for quality timber production, and weak marketing and value chains.

The Activity builds upon the outcomes of the BMEL-ITTO Project "Enhancing Conservation and Sustainable Management of Teak Forests and Legal and Sustainable Wood Supply Chains in the Greater Mekong Sub-region" (PP-A/54-331) implemented under the BWP 2021-2022. This project supported participating countries' policies and strategies promoting sustainable management of teak resources and plantation efforts in public and private land, value chain development, forest-based economic development, certification and legality of sustainably produced timber including smallholders.

Given the recent trade development of tropical timber and timber products in ITTO producing member countries, as well as ongoing challenges like deforestation, illegal trade, declining high-quality timber species, and the need to enhance product competitiveness, ITTO remains committed to facilitating the promotion of a common platform through international fora to tackle the challenges of ensuring that teak and other valuable products from legally and sustainably sources benefit member countries, improving community livelihood and local economic development.

II. Description

This Activity aims to significantly improve the production of quality timber from smallholder and local community-established plantations of teak and other valuable species in Asia-Pacific and West Africa. It involves promoting policies and programs to ensure the availability of high-quality planting material, the adoption of better silvicultural practices, access to financing to promote longer rotations, value addition and improved timber legality. Key activities include promoting financial schemes that support high-quality teak production with longer rotations and facilitating access to voluntary carbon markets. Tapping into the carbon credit markets will provide additional incentives and contribute to the global effort for climate change mitigation. It will also encourage regional and international cooperation to support the sustainable development of smallholder plantations.

To achieve the objectives of this Activity, key actions include:

- 1. Supply Chain Enhancement:
 - Conserve genetical resources of teak and other selected species.
 - Support smallholders and local communities in improved management practices for these species through field training.
 - Promote compliance with timber legality standards in smallholder/community plantations.

2. Financial schemes:

- Conduct a feasibility study for direct contracts/out-grower schemes with sourcing companies to ensure fair product pricing for smallholders.
- Investigate micro-lending schemes to address credit limitations faced by smallholders.
- Explore strategies for establishing effective forest grower associations, reducing transaction costs, and enhancing access to micro-credits.
- Assess opportunities in voluntary carbon markets to increase revenue through longer rotation cycles, providing financial security for farmers.

3. Regional and International Collaboration:

- Develop and disseminate outreach materials and training materials for the conservation and sustainable management of target species.
- Support and facilitate teak networking among ITTO member countries through quarterly webinars.

The German Federal Ministry of Food and Agriculture (BMEL) has committed to implementing this Activity, as detailed in the project document "Promoting Quality Timber Production in Smallholders and Community-based Teak and Other Valuable Species Plantations in the Tropics (PP-A/54-331A)." Throughout the implementation of this Activity, active engagement with relevant stakeholders, including CSOs, trade and industry sector, IUFRO and TEAKNET, will be invited to foster collaboration.

- Supply chains of smallholders and community-based teak and other valuable species plantation and management systems have been strengthened with easy availability of high-quality planting stock and implementation of improved practices in silviculture and timber processing and legality.
- Financing schemes for quality timber production in smallholders and community-based teak and other species plantations have been analyzed and improvements have been suggested to increase economic outcomes.
- Regional and international collaboration, information sharing and knowledge management, networking, policy development and outreach for sustainable smallholder teak and other species plantations have been strengthened.

ENHANCE COOPERATION BETWEEN ITTO AND CITES

I. Background & description

ITTO and CITES have developed strong collaborative activities to improve implementation of timber listing requirements over the past 20 years. This collaboration culminated in the large capacity building program first proposed in the 2006-2007 BWP which allowed a grant proposal seeking funding for an ITTO-CITES collaborative capacity building Program to be developed. The proposal was submitted to the European Union through the European Commission, which provided 3 million euros for a first phase running from 2007-2011. The large-scale funding from the EU/EC was extended to 2012-16 under an additional grant of 5 million euros, to be matched by the equivalent of 2.5 million euros to be raised from other donors. The activity therefore continued under ITTO's 2008-2009, 2010-2011, 2012-2013, 2013-2014 and 2015-2017 BWPs, primarily with EU funding but with additional contributions of over \$3 million from the USA, Switzerland, Japan, the Netherlands, Norway, Germany, New Zealand, China, the private sector and ITTO's BPF. The work was managed by ITTO until the end of 2016 with assistance from three regional coordinators and the CITES Secretariat and guided by a program advisory committee.

The ITTO-CITES Program completed implementation of more than 40 activities under its second phase from 2012-16. Country-specific activities were completed in Brazil, Cameroon, China, Congo, DRC, Guatemala, Indonesia, Madagascar, Malaysia and Peru, focusing on African species *Pericopsis elata* (afrormosia), *Prunus africana* (African cherry), and several *Dalbergia* (rosewood) and *Diospyros* (ebony) species from Madagascar; Asian species *Aquileria/Gyrinops* spp. (agarwood) and *Gonystylus* spp. (ramin); and Latin American species *Cedrela odorata*, *Swietenia macrophylla*, *Dalbergia retusa* and *D. stevensonii*. Eight activities were funded and completed under the Trade and Market Transparency thematic program based on a provision of the EU/EC funding grant calling for 20% of the EU funds provided to be directed to activities with objectives relevant to both the TMT and CITES programs.

The EU/EC in 2016 decided to provide further funding for work on CITES-listed tree species directly to the CITES Secretariat through a new CITES Tree Species Program (CTSP). The CTSP finalized activities in 2022, the same year that an additional 200+ tropical tree species were added to CITES Appendix II. The continuing needs of countries for support to implement existing and new CITES tree species listings, coupled with indications from the EU/EC that no further large scale grants for such work will be forthcoming, makes it imperative that other ITTO donors continue to recognize ITTO's comparative advantages in this field by supporting ITTO's CITES-related work through this on-going BWP activity in 2024-25. Using funds already provided under previous BWPs, ITTO has just completed in 2023 an NDF study for mahogany in Ecuador and is currently implementing projects to operationalize DNA tracking of *Pericopsis elata* and *Prunus africana* in Cameroon and to implement a inventory control/tracking methodology for rosewoods in Madagascar. An additional project to implement DNA tracking of cumaru (one of the species newly listed in 2022) in Peru will also be implemented in 2024-25 using remaining funds from previous BWPs. Negotiations are currently underway with the CITES Secretariat on future collaboration on activities of mutual interest. New funding pledged under this BWP to this activity will allow ITTO to assist additional Member Countries in implementing CITES requirements for listed tropical timber species, as well as facilitating ongoing collaboration with the **CITES** Secretariat.

During the biennium and as appropriate/required in consultation with the CITES Secretariat, this activity will facilitate:

- assistance in implementing CITES requirements for listed tropical timber species (e.g. inventories, NDFs, tracking);
- collaboration with the CITES Secretariat;
- assistance with preparing proposals for CITES listings of new tropical tree species; and
- attendance and participation of ITTO in relevant CITES meetings and fora.

MONITOR PROGRESS IN THE APPLICATION OF CRITERIA AND INDICATORS FOR SUSTAINABLE FOREST MANAGEMENT

I. Background

Under ITTC Decisions 5(XXX), 9(XXX), 4(XXXIV), ITTO has collaborated extensively with other C&I processes (e.g. Montreal Process, Pan-European Process, FAO Forest Resource Assessment, etc.) to promote the understanding of the role of C&I in contributing to sustainable forest management and the use of this important tool for forest monitoring reporting and assessment (MAR). This activity will allow for on-going collaboration with other related forest reporting processes to continue.

The final version of the revised/adapted set of ITTO C&I for sustainable forest management adapted to Africa context was posted on the ITTO website for comments by ITTO Members, and by the deadline of 1 November 2022 there were no comments. The ITTO Secretariat is currently undergoing the translation (English/French, two ITTO working languages used by ITTO member countries in Africa) with final editing, layout, design and publication.

II. Description

This activity will allow for additional workshops during 2024-2025 to disseminate the revised set of ITTO C&I for sustainable forest management adapted to Africa context, which was approved in 2022 with a focus on ITTO member countries in Africa. The activity will allow the holding of two regional workshops in Africa (one for English speaking countries and one for French speaking countries) for the promotion of the abovementioned ITTO C&I for sustainable forest management adapted to Africa context. The curriculum of these workshops will evolve to ensure that participants receive up to date information on all relevant aspects of monitoring, assessing and reporting (MAR) on forests.

- Relevant stakeholders in ITTO producer member countries in Africa familiar with the revised set of ITTO C&I for sustainable forest management adapted to Africa context;
- ITTO concerns and priorities reflected in international initiatives on MAR related to forests; and

STATISTICAL CAPACITY BUILDING WORKSHOPS

I. Background

The level and quality of reporting on forestry sector statistics by ITTO producer countries is variable and many countries remain unable to meet their international and national statistical reporting requirements. Although ITTO has conducted a number of regional and national statistical training workshops, country-level assistance is still required because each country's problems and solutions differ and because of staff turnover. ITTO will work in liaison with FAO and other partners in delivering these workshops, tailoring training to country needs and building on collaborative relationships developed in workshops carried out under previous BWPs.

II. Description

The purpose of this activity is to support up to four regional training workshops or other activities on request, to enable producer countries to meet their reporting requirements on forestry sector statistics. In order to maximize the number of participants per workshop, ITTO and FAO have been organizing regional workshops for which 30-40 participants from 15-20 countries are invited to participate to meetings and a field trip for 3-4 days. Both organizations coordinate these regional workshops on a round basis in the three producing regions (Africa, Asia-Pacific and Latin America-Caribbean regions).

Although the objectives of country-level workshops will be tailored to specific needs, these will include the following:

- Establish and reinforce a network of forest products statistical correspondents;
- Review and assess the current state of national forest products statistics at regional and national levels, identifying the main weaknesses and constraints of the current systems;
- Improve the framework for future national statistical processes, including methodologies for statistical reporting and requirements for resources and equipment;
- Provide training on standardized international definitions as a base for completing the Joint Forest Sector Questionnaire; and
- Promote an information culture.

III. Expected outputs

- Information on the status and constraints of current national forestry sector statistics discussed;
- The network of different actors in the value chain, including the public and private sectors, are linked to generate national statistics on production, consumption and trade in wood products. Agreement is reached on sustainable cooperation on forestry sector statistics between the various agencies;
- A roadmap for strengthening the national system of forest products national and international statistical reporting is developed;
- The country's international reporting requirements and requirements of the ITTO Joint Forest Sector Questionnaire are understood; and
- Share common concerns and possible solutions among the participants from various countries.

The aim of this activity is to be able to organize up to 4 regional workshops which costs are shared equally between FAO and ITTO. PREVENTION AND MANAGEMENT OF FIRE IN TROPICAL TIMBER-PRODUCING FORESTS

I. Background

Urgent action is needed to improve fire management in tropical regions, evident from devastating fires in the Amazon and elsewhere. Forest and Land fires, exacerbated by drought and heatwaves are a major driver of forest loss and degradation in many tropical countries with releases of carbon dioxide, biodiversity loss and severe human health problems. ITTO has been actively promoting in line with the ITTO Guidelines on Fire Management in Tropical Forests published 1997. These projects have assisted in developing and implementing fire prevention and control strategies for forest managers, planners, and local communities in tropical countries. ITTO has formed partnerships with key organizations, including the United Nations International Strategy for Disaster Reduction (UNISDR) Global Wildland Advisory Group and the Global Fire Monitoring Center (GFMC). Additionally, ITTO has supported a series of International Wildland Fire Conferences, held in 2011 (South Africa), 2015 (Korea), 2019 (Brazil), and 2023 (Portugal). Through these guidelines and field projects, ITTO collaborates with organizations and agencies to create and implement national action plans for forest fires and facilitates meetings for regional forest fire networks.

Under the 2018-2020 BWP, the Government of Japan provided funding of US\$ 2,210,526 to develop two fire projects. These projects aimed to enhance the capacities of national and local authorities in Indonesia and Peru to take urgent action for prevention and response to forest fires. Both projects concluded in 2022, with an ex-post evaluation scheduled for 2024 to assess their impact.

II. Description

The Activity aims to review and analyze the technical information and knowledge gained from the implementation of successfully completed ITTO projects as well as the development of Integrated Fire Management (IFM) framework, which promote ecosystem-based solutions, stakeholder engagement, inclusion, prevention, preparedness, response and recovery. This analysis includes the Landscape Fire Governance Framework, approved in May 2023 at the 8th International Wildland Fire Conference in Porto, Portugal. Based on the outcome of this analysis, the Activity will update and revise the ITTO *Guidelines on Fire Management in Tropical Forests* (1997) to provide a base for policy makers and managers at various levels to develop programs and projects in which the specific national, socio-economic, and naturally occurring problems related to fire in tropical natural and planted forests. Partners in this analysis and revision of the ITTO Fire Guidelines include the Global Fire Monitoring Center (GFMC), which supports various regional forest fire networks in the tropics.

- Enhanced partnerships for effective coordination and synergies among stakeholders in combating and preventing forest and land fires.

OPERATIONALIZING THE ITTO POLICY GUIDELINES ON GENDER EQUALITY AND EMPOWERING WOMEN

I. Background

ITTO is committed to gender mainstreaming and enhancing gender equality outcomes across its policy and project work. The ITTO Policy Guidelines on Gender Equality and Empowering Women (GEEW) approved at the 53rd ITTC institutionalize this commitment. The Policy Guidelines serve as a framework for gender integration in ITTO policies, plans, programmes, projects, activities and internal functioning and are intended to enhance the impact and effectiveness of the Organization's operations in all areas and at all levels.

II. Description

In order to implement the gender policy guidelines, a number of possible actions had been proposed in the report of the consultant presented to the 53rd ITTC. While a number of the proposed actions can be initiated or undertaken within existing resources, the following actions proposed for implementation under the BWP 2021-2022 require voluntary contributions from Members for their implementation.

- Supplement the gender guidance contained in the ITTO Manual for Project Formulation (2009 edition) with a new Appendix D to provide guidance on gender analysis.
- Update ITTO project-related manuals to include guidance on gender-related results-based management (outcomes, impacts, etc.), including gender-sensitive results indicators and sex-disaggregated data.
- Include a training module on gender integration in all ITTO training workshops on proposal preparation to ensure Executing Agencies and project coordinators have the skills needed to properly integrate gender issues into project planning, design, monitoring and evaluation.
- Provide training to all ITTO staff members, Executing Agencies and project coordinators so that they understand the importance of GEEW and how to integrate gender issues in their work.
- Participate in meetings/initiatives to develop a network of forest gender experts amongst ITTO collaborative partners, including CPF organizations, , UN WOMEN, interested CSAG and TAG organizations.
- Conduct an exploratory study on the role of women in forestry/forest industry, manufacturing and trade.

Enhance the effective integration of gender considerations in all aspects of ITTO's policy and project work. Build the capacity of ITTO and its Members to promote gender quality and empower women in the tropical forest sector.

DISSEMINATING ITTO GUIDELINES FOR FOREST LANDSCAPE RESTORATION IN THE TROPICS

I. Background

The *ITTO Guidelines for Forest Landscape Restoration in the Tropics* (2020) provides guidance from policymakers to foresters and farmers in restoring degraded forest landscapes, thereby providing vital goods and ecosystem services and creating sustainable rural livelihoods and employment. Forest landscape restoration (FLR) is an inclusive approach requiring some guidance to assist decision-makers and practitioners in putting it into practice, through dissemination and outreach actions. Potential international partners could be, among others, the following: Bonn Challenge with its global call for the restoration; World Resources Institute (WRI) through its 20-20 Target Initiative; and the Target 2 of the Kunming-Montreal Global Biodiversity Framework, adopted during CBD COP 15 in December 2022.

II. Description

Taking into account the fact that there have been major developments in forest-related policy international initiatives, such as the United Nations Decade on Ecosystem Restoration (2021-2030), United Nations Sustainable Development Goal 15 (SDG-15) that promotes halting global deforestation and the Paris Agreement on Climate which places efforts to tackle deforestation and promote sustainable forestry as a core achievement within the framework of global carbon mitigation measures, this Activity will be implemented as follows:

- Production of outreach and communication materials to facilitate the dissemination of the ITTO Guidelines for Forest Landscape Restoration in the Tropics (2020);
- Participation in relevant international FLR events with the involvement of ITTO international partners;
- Organize three regional capacity building workshops, each of the three tropical regions.

III. Expected outputs

- ITTO Guidelines for Forest Landscape Restoration disseminated through county or/and regional workshops in conjunction with international partners, particularly with the members of the Collaborative Partnerships on Forests (CPF);
- Knowledge and experience in promoting the principles of FLR enhanced for ITTO stakeholders.

DEVELOPING AND OPERATIONALIZING ITTO'S POLICY GUIDELINES

SUPPORT FOR WOMEN'S GROUPS WITH GENDER EMPOWERMENT AND FOREST LANDSCAPE RESTORATION IN TOGO

I. Background

This Activity is funded under the pilot phase of the Programmatic Approach of the new financing architecture Third Programme Line (PL3) titled *"Forest Landscape Restoration and Resilient Livelihoods"* in conformance with the implementation of Decision 8(LV) calling upon the ITTO Secretariat to play a more proactive role in seeking new funding avenues and partners for the funding of ITTO's work. It will contribute to and operationalize the ITTO Policy Guidelines on Gender Equality and Empowering Women and the ITTO Guidelines for Forest Landscape Restoration (FLR) in the Tropics, as a pilot case to be implemented in Togo. Any additional funds pledged will replicate this Activity in two other African countries to be decided in due time and in consultation with the donors and the women's groups involved in FLR.

II. Description

Women in rural communities are in charge of providing many of the essential livelihood functions for their families and are disproportionately affected by poverty, the impact of climate change and the rapid decline of natural resources on which they depend. This Activity will serve as an example and encouragement for other women groups in Togo to take the initiative to emancipate themselves from traditional gender roles and to improve their livelihoods as follows:

- To build the organizational, technical and material capacities for empowering local women's groups regarding the implementation of forest landscape restoration and agro-forestry activities in Togo, with the potential of replication in two other African countries to be decided in due time; and
- To increase their resilience against impacts from climate change.

Additional funds have been mobilized for 2024, with the aim to consolidate and sustain the ground achievements of REFACOF-Togo's women groups realized during the implementation of the Phase 1 and Phase 2 of PP-A/56-341, in Togo's Blitta and Lacs Prefectures.

III. Expected outputs

- Capacity of selected women's groups in the rehabilitation of degraded forest ecosystems reinforced,
- Resilience of recipient communities to climate change and the improvement of their living conditions through increased and strengthened household incomes,
- ITTO Policy Guidelines on Gender Equality and ITTO Guidelines for Forest Landscape Restoration in the Tropics implemented.

CONSERVATION AND SUSTAINABLE USE OF BIODIVERSITY IN TROPICAL TIMBER PRODUCTION FORESTS

I. Background

Recognizing the critical importance of tropical production forests in promoting the conservation and sustainable use of biodiversity, ITTO adopted the ITTO/IUCN Guidelines for the conservation and sustainable use of biodiversity in tropical timber production forests at the Forty-fourth Session of the Council, in November 2008. In collaboration with IUCN and other relevant partners, these guidelines have been promoted at various levels. Based on the provisions of the memorandum of understanding signed by the CBD and ITTO Secretariats, ITTO has actively promoted the Joint ITTO-CBD Collaborative Initiative for Tropical Forest Biodiversity since 2010, which helps finance on-the-ground projects in the three tropical regions.

The Kunming-Montreal Global Biodiversity Framework, adopted during CBD COP 15 in December 2022, has set out the four global goals and 27 targets for their achievements by 2030. The ITTO-CBD Collaborative Initiative will prioritize activities to contribute to the achievement of forest-related goals and targets identified in the Kunming-Montreal Global Biodiversity Framework, which are in correlation with some ITTO objectives and priorities, specifically:

- Target 2: Ensure that by 2030 at least 30% of degraded ecosystems are under restoration.
- Target 3: Ensure that by 2030 at least 30% of land and ocean are protected through well-connected and equitable governed systems of protected areas and other effective area-based conservation measures.
- Target 10: Ensure that areas of agriculture, aquaculture, fisheries and forestry are managed sustainably.
- Target 15: Take legal, or policy measures to encourage business to reduce negative impacts on biodiversity and to promote actions to ensure sustainable patterns of production.
- Target 16: Ensure that people are encouraged to make sustainable consumption choices.
- Target 20: Strengthen capacity-building and development, access to and transfer of technology, and promote development of and access to innovation and technical and scientific cooperation.

II. Description

This activity will contribute to promote the conservation and sustainable use of biodiversity in tropical timber production forests through the following actions:

- Facilitate the engagement of the ITTO Secretariat in the Partnerships for the Targets 2 & 3 and the High Ambition Coalition (HAC) for Nature and People to support the achievements of forest-related goals and targets of the Kunming-Montreal Global Biodiversity Framework.
- Assist the participation of selected ITTO biodiversity project team members in CBD COP 16 in 2024 with the organization of a joint side event with CBD to share ITTO experiences and insights in relevant international events.
- Support the implementation of the ITTO-CBD Collaborative Initiative Programme for the years 2024-2025. This support includes the organization of three regional capacity building workshops and dissemination of their outcomes at international biodiversity events.

- Sharing ITTO experience in promoting the conservation and sustainable use of biodiversity in tropical timber production forests;
- Wider knowledge and implementation of the forest-based targets and goals of the Kunming-Montreal Global Biodiversity Framework;
- Effective implementation of the ITTO-CBD Collaborative Initiative for 2024-2025 as well as increased partnerships and fundraising activities for its implementation.

ITTO will generate understanding for the need of investing into forest resources and landscape to offset the emerging global supply deficit of timber and non-timber products and to enhance their role in moving towards a circular economy. ITTO will help increase the understanding that sustainable forest management and legal and sustainable supply chains will generate multiple wins for the benefit of people, the environment and climate. Through this activity, ITTO will be able to collaborate and contribute concretely and meaningfully to the work of the UNFF and CPF as well to other global initiatives by providing relevant inputs, participating proactively in these global fora s as well as to contributing to the costs of joint activities.

COLLABORATION ON CRITERIA AND INDICATORS FOR SFM

I. Background

Under ITTC Decisions 5(XXX), 9(XXX), 4(XXXIV), ITTO has collaborated extensively with other C&I processes (e.g. Montreal Process, Pan-European Process, FAO Forest Resource Assessment, etc.) to promote the understanding of the role of C&I in contributing to sustainable forest management and the use of this important tool for forest monitoring reporting and assessment (MAR). This activity will allow for on-going collaboration with other related forest reporting processes to continue.

II. Description

Funding remaining from previous BWPs has been used to support ITTO's participation in C&I related events being organized by the Montreal Process in association with the Asia Pacific Forestry Commission meeting in October 2023 in Sydney, Australia. Additional funding for this activity will facilitate continued active ITTO participation in the global dialogue on MAR related to forests, including the CPF Task Force on Streamlining Forest Reporting, discussions on harmonizing reporting on forests between ITTO's SFM Tropics and FAO's Forest Resources Assessment (including through the Collaborative Forest Resources Questionnaire process), and various relevant meetings and initiatives of other international C&I processes.

ITTO ANNUAL MARKET DISCUSSION

I. Background

The ITTO Annual Market Discussion is an annual forum for international dialogue on a selected theme of the international tropical timber trade. The event is important for delegates of ITTO member countries and trade representatives to discuss and deliberate on germane and often complex trade policy issues confronting tropical timber and timber products. This strategic policy activity strengthens the event by providing for the engagement of keynote speakers at the event.

II. Description

The theme of the ITTO Annual Market Discussion is selected by the Trade Advisory Group (TAG) in consultation with the Executive Director during the session of the ITTC preceding the event. The event is coordinated by the Secretariat and the Trade Advisory Group (TAG), in consultation with other relevant experts and held in a joint session of the technical committees. Keynote speakers will be selected and invited by the Executive Director in consultation with the Coordinator of TAG and will be provided with ITTO financial support to cover duty travel and DSA.

EXPERT PANEL FOR TECHNICAL APPRAISAL OF PROJECT PROPOSALS

I. Background

The Expert Panel for technical appraisal of project proposals appraises and classifies the proposals received under the ITTO Project Cycle based on the 'Revised ITTO System for Technical Appraisal of Project and Pre-project Proposals'. The panel is composed of twelve members, divided into six members from producer countries (two from each sub-region) and six members from consumer countries. The Panel makes recommendations for adjustments to proposals in order to ensure their technical soundness. Panel members are nominated for period of two years with the possibility to extend for a third year.

II. Description

As defined the TORs for the Expert Panel, the Panel shall: (i) Assess new Project and Pre-project Proposals submitted to the organization. The recommendations for amendments to these proposals shall be made by the Expert Panel exclusively for the purpose of ensuring their technical soundness; (ii) Screen the Project Proposals for their relevance to ITTO's Action Plan and Work Programs (in the areas of Economic Information and Market Intelligence, Reforestation and Forest Management, and Forest Industry), and consistency with ITTO decisions and policy guidelines, but not otherwise prioritize them; (iii) Where reformulation involving major amendments is recommended, request to carry out a final appraisal of the revised versions of Project and Pre-project Proposals, prior to their presentation to the relevant ITTO Committees; (iv) Report on the results of the technical assessment of Project and Pre-project Proposals to the submitting governments and to the ITTO Council and Committees, through the ITTO Secretariat; (v) The Expert Panel shall take into consideration previous Expert Panels' reports. The Expert Panel, in assessing Projects and Pre-projects, shall also take into account: their relevance to the objectives of the ITTA, 2006 and the requirement that a Project or Pre-project should contribute to the achievement of one or more of the Agreement objectives; their environmental and social effects; their economic effects; their cost effectiveness; the need to avoid duplication of efforts; and, if applicable, their relationship and integration with ITTO policy work and their consistency with the ITTO Strategic Action Plan and relevant ITTO Guidelines.

ITTO FELLOWSHIP PROGRAMME

I. Background

The ITTO Fellowship programme began in 1989 under PD 60/89(M,F,I) and was replaced by PD 001/93 (M,F,I) in 1993 which was also subsequently replaced in 1999 by the Freezailah Fellowship Fund through Council Decision 4(XXVII). As at October 2023, the Programme which began in 1989, has enabled more than 1,400 young and mid-career people from 49 countries working for governments, research institutions, universities, civil society and the private sector to pursue their professional development and improved their career prospects. The Fellowships are awarded mainly to nationals of ITTO Producer member countries.

II. Description

The Fellowship programme is geared towards building capacity in the following priority areas:

- Improving the transparency of the tropical timber market;
- Improving marketing and distribution of tropical timber species from sustainably managed sources;
- Improving market access for tropical timber exports from sustainably managed source;
- Securing the tropical timber resource base;
- Improving the tropical timber resource base, including through the application of criteria and indicators for sustainable forest management;
- Enhancing, technical, financial and human capacities to manage the tropical timber resource base;
- Promoting increased and further processing of tropical timber from sustainably managed sources;
- Improving marketing and standardization of tropical timber exports; and
- Improving efficiency of processing tropical timber from sustainable sources.

ITTO MARKET INFORMATION SERVICE (MIS)

I. Background

The Market Information Service (MIS) has been part of the Secretariat's work since 1996. The main output of the activity [originally PD 16/93 Rev.3 (M)] is the *Tropical Timber Market Report* (TTMR). The report contains price data for about 500 tropical timber products as well as relevant market news from around the globe. The TTMR is disseminated online, by email and in hardcopy to over 18,000 subscribers.

II. Description

The Market Information Service serves to broaden awareness and disseminate information on the state of the tropical timber market. It is undertaken by a full-time Coordinator, who is responsible for publishing the *TTMR* and liaising with eleven market correspondents in producer and consumer countries to obtain up-to-date market news, information and prices on tropical timber products. The Market Information Service Coordinator also engages with other experts in the trade and works with the Trade Advisory Group (TAG) to convene the ITTO Annual Market Discussion.

ENHANCEMENT OF STATISTICAL WORK AND DATABASES ON STATISTICS

I. Background

The Joint Forest Sector Questionnaire is the primary data source of ITTO forestry sector statistics and is a collaborative activity undertaken by ITTO, FAO, UNECE and Eurostat. These organizations meet annually to review datasets of the previous year and determine any improvements that are required, plan the next year's questionnaire, and make recommendations on changes to international customs classifications for timber codes. ITTO's participation ensures that tropical wood products are given the appropriate attention in international statistical reporting mechanisms.

Statistical data derived from the Joint Forest Sector Questionnaire is, however, insufficient to provide a complete analysis of the tropical timber market situation. Additional data and other information are required to complete the analysis and to provide a cross check with ITTO derived datasets. A major source of inaccurate reporting of international data on tropical timber production and trade is the deficiency in usage of accurate conversion factors, particularly for weight to volume measurements.

II. Description

This strategic policy activity is aimed at:

- Maintaining the involvement of ITTO staff in the work of the Inter-secretariat Working Group (IWG) on Forestry Sector Statistics and Joint Forest Sector Questionnaire Process;
- Maintaining data subscriptions and maintenance of access to international forest products trade databases and additional market and trade information;
- Participating to international conferences on forest wood products statistic; and
- Reviewing and consolidating tropical wood products conversion factors for determining wood products production and trade statistics.

- Recommendations on appropriate conversion factors formulated and provided to ITTO member countries in the JFSQ process.

BIENNIAL REVIEW AND ASSESSMENT OF THE WORLD TIMBER SITUATION

I. Background

ITTO's Biennial Review and Assessment of the World Timber Situation compiles the most up-to-date and reliable international statistics available on global production and trade of timber, with an emphasis on the tropics. It also provides information on trends in forest area, forest management and the economies of ITTO member countries. The review is based on information submitted by ITTO member countries through the Joint Forest Sector Questionnaire, supplemented by other sources as necessary.

Under the ITTA, 1994, draft elements were produced by the ITTO Secretariat to assist the International Tropical Timber Council (ITTC) in undertaking its annual review of the international timber situation. In accordance with Article 28 of ITTA, 2006, the review and assessment of the international timber situation has been undertaken biennially beginning with the 2013-2014 biennium.

The ITTC will undertake the biennial review and assessment based on draft elements for the review and assessment of the international timber situation. These draft elements will be prepared by the Secretariat and will comprise statistics and available data on production, imports and exports of timber products, with emphasis on tropical timber products, and an analysis of economic and market developments. The elements for the review will be mainly based on information extracted from national responses to the ITTO/UNECE/FAO/EUROSTAT Joint Forest Sector Questionnaire and from other sources.

II. Description

The draft elements of the Biennial Review and Assessment of the World Timber Situation are usually presented during the first year of the biennium during the Council Session. This allows members to share their comments on the data and analysis presented. The review is then published during the second year of the biennium.
