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# PROGRESS REPORT ON THE IMPLEMENTATION OF THE ITTO BIENNIAL WORK PROGRAMME FOR 2015-2016

#### [Item 13 of the Provisional Agenda]

This document is prepared pursuant to Council Decision 2(L), which requested the Executive Director to report on the implementation status of the ITTO Biennial Work Programme (BWP) for the years 2015 and 2016. The document contains the Work Programme activities as approved in Council Decision 2(L). The columns on 'Expected SAP Outcomes' and 'SAP Indicators' have been replaced by the column reflecting the 'implementation status' of all activities carried out and being undertaken by the Council, the Committees and the Secretariat during the biennium. For information on the columns on 'Expected SAP Outcomes' and 'SAP Indicators' please consult the BWP 2015-2016 as approved in Council Decision 2(L).

In accordance with the recommendation of the IAG, the 2015-16 BWP is proposed to be extended through 2017 and a new BWP for 2018-19 will be presented for consideration and approval by the Council at the 53<sup>rd</sup> ITTC in 2017.

The Biennial Work Programme (BWP) 2015-2016 as approved in Council Decision 2(L) includes fifty-one activities grouped in accordance with the strategic priorities identified in the ITTO Strategic Action Plan 2013-2018 (SAP) plus routine, administrative and financial activities. Activities 50 and 51 were added to the BWP on recommendation of the CRF and CFA, respectively, at the close of the 50<sup>th</sup> session and not categorized according to strategic priorities. The activities are under the responsibility of the Council and the Committees. Fifteen activities are 'regular session's work' with no cost implications, six activities are funded from core budget and 30 activities are seeking voluntary contributions.

The total funding sought under the BWP 2015-2016 is US\$9,495,509. This is divided into US\$7,698,159 sought in voluntary contributions and US\$1,797,350 approved under the core budget (see Table 1). US\$50,000 for Activity 4b has already been pledged under the BWP 2013-2014. Activity 25 on Independent Market Monitoring (IMM) is fully funded by a grant from the EU in the amount of Euro 4 million through 2018 and is not included in the calculation of the voluntary contributions sought under this BWP.

Table 2 divides the voluntary contributions by strategic priority of the ITTO Strategic Action Plan 2013-2018. It reflects the voluntary contributions sought by year and the contributions received so far. At the time of preparing this report voluntary contributions in the amount of US\$3,577,481 have been received, which is equivalent to 46.4% of the total voluntary contributions sought under this BWP. More than half of the funding received (US\$1,773,659) was for Activity 8, ITTO-CITES (Strategic Priority 2). Routine Activities included two activities (Act. 50 – Survey on the use of ITTO Guidelines; Act. 51 – Study on regional representation) seeking voluntary contributions. Both activities have received full funding, i.e. Activity 50 from voluntary contributions and Activity 51 from the Working Capital Account (pursuant to Council Decision 2(L). Both activities have been completed and were reported to the 51<sup>st</sup> ITTC, Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia.

Table 3 shows the number of activities under each Strategic Priority and under Routine, Administrative and Financial Activities and includes the number and funding status of activities seeking voluntary contributions.

Out of the thirty activities seeking voluntary contributions, four activities (13.3 %) have received full funding, fifteen activities (50%) have received partial funding and eleven activities (36.7%) remain unfunded.

Activity 19 has components funded from Core Budget and from Voluntary Contributions

The categorization of activities by responsible body is reflected in Table 4. Twenty six activities are under responsibility of the Council, one under Council/Committees, one under the Joint Committees and four under the Committee on Finance and Administration (CFA). The remaining nineteen activities are responsibility of the technical Committees, i.e. eight under Reforestation and Forest Management (CRF), five under Forest Industry (CFI) and six under Economics, Statistics and Markets (CEM).

Out of thirteen activities seeking voluntary contributions under responsibility of the Council, eleven have received full or partial funding and two remain unfunded.

Out of seventeen activities seeking voluntary contributions and under responsibility of the ITTO technical Committees, eight have received full or partial funding and nine remain unfunded. While all four activities under CEM have received full or partial funding, none of the five activities under CFI has received any funding yet. Under CRF four activities have received full or partial funding, while four remain unfunded.

Below a brief compilation of the progress made and achievements of the activities which have received full or

partial funding. For more details please refer to the respective activity in the BWP Progress Report.

### Strategic Priority 1: Promote good governance and enabling policy frameworks for strengthening SFM and related trade and enhancing SFM financing and investment

All six activities under this priority are seeking voluntary contributions. Three activities have received partial funding (Act.2; Act.4a; Act.6b).

- Under Activity 2, the draft report of the consultant Activity 2 was presented to the 51<sup>st</sup> ITTC in Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia. No additional funding was receiving to allow for follow-up work on the report
- Under Activity 4a the 1<sup>st</sup> regional workshop on the ITTO Voluntary Guidelines for the Sustainable Management of Natural Tropical Forest was held in Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia, 17-20 August 2015. The report was presented the 49<sup>th</sup> CRF in Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia
- Under Activity 6b ITTO has provided partial funding for printing the Spanish version of FRA 2015 and using funding from the BWP 2013-2014 ITTO has assisted in the review of modules of the FAO SFM toolbox. ITTO has participated in the CFRQ data review meeting in June 2015

### Strategic Priority 2: Increase the contribution of tropical forests to national and local economies including through international trade

Both activities under this priority are seeking voluntary contributions. Activity 8 has received full funding, Activity 7 remains unfunded.

• Under Activity 8, the progress report of the ITTO-CITES program will be presented under Provisional Agenda Item 10 [Document ITTC(LII)/4]

### Strategic Priority 3: Enhance conservation and sustainable use of biodiversity in tropical timber producing countries

All three activities under this priority are seeking voluntary contributions. One activity has received partial funding.

 Under Activity 10, the report on the review of actions taken by ITTO and others related to conserve, restore and sustainably manage mangrove forests and ecosystems was presented to the 49<sup>th</sup> CRF in Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia. The activity has been impacted by the impairment of ITTO funds and any further work will require additional funding

### Strategic Priority 4: Reduce tropical deforestation and forest degradation and enhance provision of environmental services

All three activities under this priority are seeking voluntary contributions. Two activities have received partial funding.

- Under Activity 12b, the report on the study on carbon removals and emissions associated with production and use of harvested tropical wood products was presented to the 49<sup>th</sup> CRF in Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia
- Under Activity 14b, ITTO has supported 14 participants to attend the 6<sup>th</sup> International Wildland Fire Conference 2015. A side event was organized and a special TFU edition on Forest Fires (TFU 24/2) was published

### Strategic Priority 5: Improve the quality and availability of information on tropical forests, forest product markets and trade

Under this priority, eleven activities have been approved. Five activities are funded from the core budget, five

activities are seeking voluntary contributions and one activity (Activity 19) has sub-activities funded from the core budget and from voluntary contributions (partially funded). Activity 25 on Independent Market Monitoring (IMM) is fully funded by the EU through a grant of € 4,000,000 for the period 2014-2018. Out of the remaining four activities seeking voluntary contributions, two have received partial funding and two remain unfunded.

The activities supported by the core budget include:

- Activity 15 Publication of the ITTO Tropical Forest Update (TFU)
   Release of the free TFU app making TFU available on smart phones and tablets
- Activity 16 Preparation and conduct of the Annual Market Discussion in collaboration with the Trade Advisory Group (TAG)
- Activity 17 Publication of the ITTO Tropical Timber Market Report under the Market Information Service (MIS)
- Activity 18 Enhancement of ITTO statistical work and databases on statistics
- Activity 19 Enhance public relations, education and outreach activities
- Activity 22 Undertake the Biennial Review and Assessment of the World Timber Situation. The draft elements for the biennial review will be presented by the consultant at the 52<sup>nd</sup> ITTC

All above activities have been fully implemented. Under Activity 19 several technical reports have been published, co-published and disseminated, including:

- PS 20 'Voluntary SFM Guidelines'
- PS 21 'Criteria & Indicators for SFM'
- TS 43 'Technical guide on the quantification of carbon benefits in ITTO Projects' (with partial support from Activity 21)
- TS 44 'Impact of Timber Procurement Policies'
- TS 45 'Europe's Changing Tropical Timber Trade'
- ITTO Annual Reports 2014 and 2015
- Eight editions of the ITTO e-Newsletter 'Tropical Timber News' have been published
- ITTO-CITES Program and related newsletters
- FLEGT Independent Market Monitoring (IMM)

Activity 20 has been suspended due to the impairment of ITTO funds.

Under Activity 21, the synthesis of the aggregated achievements of the ITTO Thematic Programmes on REDDES and TFLET was presented to the 51<sup>st</sup> ITTC in Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia. The activity has also provided partial support for the publication of TS 43. The work on the development of a new website and the integration of other web-based system was terminated. The activity has been suspended due to the impairment of ITTO funds.

Activity 23 was implemented by the European Timber Trade Federation (ETTF). The website is operational and attracting many hits.

Under Activity 25 the baseline report on EU imports of tropical timber was completed and was published in ITTO's Technical Series (TS 45 'Europe's Changing Tropical Timber Trade'). The funding provided by the EC for this activity has been impacted by the impairment of ITTO funds and work on IMM is suspended until an agreement on how to proceed can be finalized with the EC/EU.

Strategic Priority 6: Build and develop human resource capacity to implement SFM and increase trade in forest goods and services from sustainably managed forests

The eight activities under this priority are seeking voluntary contributions. Six activities have received partial funding, while two remain unfunded.

Under Activity 26 support will be provided for the participation of TAG and CSAG at the Council Sessions in

2015 and 2016. The activity has been impacted by the impairment of ITTO funds.

Under Activity 27 the Secretariat has attended the Collaborative Partnership on Forests (CPF) meetings, meetings of the Ad Hoc Expert Group 1 & 2 and the UNFF11.

Under Activity 28, the progress report on the implementation of the ITTO Fellowship Programme [Document ITTC(LII)/12] will be presented to the Council under Provisional Agenda Item 18. The award of new fellowships has been suspended due to the impairment of ITTO funds.

Under Activity 29 ITTO and FAO jointly organized a regional workshop on forest product statistics for the Caribbean region in Saint Augustine, Trinidad & Tobago, 12-14 April 2016. No further workshops are planned due to the impairment of ITTO funds.

Under Activity 32 the Secretariat held informal talks with the Government of Mexico and of several other Latin American countries on the possibility to organize a five-day international seminar to discuss forestry extension services and schemes, possibly in late 2016. The activity has been impacted by the impairment of ITTO funds.

Activity 33 is being implemented by TRAFFIC. Following the formation of the Steering Committee, a series of briefing meetings and a national workshop in May 2016, the draft timber manual and guide is almost completed and is being reviewed by selected governmental agencies in Malaysia. The activity is affected by the impairment of ITTO funds.

#### Routine, Administrative and Financial Activities

Under this category, eighteen activities have been approved. Fifteen activities are 'regular sessions work' with no cost implications. Activity 34 (Expert Panel) is funded from Core Budget. Activity 50 has been fully funded from voluntary contributions and Activity 51 has been funded from the Working Capital Account.

Under Activity 34 the 51<sup>st</sup> Expert Panel was held in Yokohama, Japan from 1-5 February 2016. The 52<sup>nd</sup> Expert Panel was cancelled due to the impairment of ITTO funds and due to insufficient payments of assessed contributions to the administrative budget by June 2016. The report of the 51<sup>st</sup> EP will be presented to the Joint Committees under Item 1 [Documents ITTC/EP-51].

Under Activity 50 an on-line survey on the use of the ITTO SFM related guidelines has been conducted. The report was presented to the 49<sup>th</sup> CRF in Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia.

Under Activity 51 the report on the study on regional ITTO presence and representation was presented to the 51<sup>st</sup> ITTC in Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia.

#### Concluding remarks and difficulties encountered

Out of the 30 activities under this BWP seeking voluntary funding, four have received full funding, fifteen partial funding and eleven remain unfunded. The following eight (sub)-activities have been completed:

- Activity 2 Development of ITTO Guidelines to incorporate gender equity in the Organization's activities, programmes and projects in member countries
- Activity 4a Publish the ITTO Voluntary Guidelines as a policy document in the three languages (English, French and Spanish) and disseminate these guidelines to key stakeholders in ITTO member countries and the international community
- Activity 12b Study on carbon removals and emissions associated with production and use of harvested tropical wood products
- Activity 14b Support Wildfire Networks and support attendance at the 6th International Wildland Fire Conference
- Activity 22a Publication of the biennial review and assessment of the world timber situation for 2013-

2014 in the first half of 2015

- Activity 23 Creation of web-based 'One-Stop' interactive profiles of the wood based industry, trade
  and forestry sectors in producer member countries to support tropical timber market
  transparency and diversification
- Activity 50 Undertake a survey to assess the use of the various ITTO guidelines on the sustainable management of plantations, secondary forests, biodiversity and natural forests in the tropics
- Activity 51 Study on Regional ITTO Presence and Representation

While the Fellowship Programme (Activity 28) has been able to meet pending obligations from past awards, no new awards have been made in 2016.

The impairment of ITTO funds has impacted all ongoing BWP activities funded through voluntary contributions, except Activity 8, ITTO-CITES. The total amount affected is approximately US\$1,350,000 across nineteen activities.
