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PROGRESS REPORT ON THE IMPLEMENTATION OF THE ITTO BIENNIAL WORK PROGRAMME FOR 2018-2019

[Item 10 of the Provisional Agenda]

This document is prepared pursuant to Council Decision 2(LIII), which requested the Executive Director to report on the implementation status of the ITTO Biennial Work Programme (BWP) for the years 2018 and 2019. The document contains the activities as approved in Council Decision 2(LIII), however the columns on 'Relevance' and 'Responsible Body' have been replaced by the column on the 'Implementation Status'. For information on 'Relevance' and 'Responsible Body' please see Annex 1. For the detailed terms of reference of each activity, please refer to the BWP 2018-2019 as approved in Council Decision 2(LIII).

The Biennial Work Programme (BWP) 2018-2019 was adopted with Council Decision 2(LIII) and includes 41 activities divided into two parts. Part 1 includes 26 activities requiring financing through core budget, voluntary contributions or other sources. Part 2 includes 15 administrative and financial activities that do not require financing. With a view to provide a coherent structure, the activities under Part 1 have been categorized into the five groups according to their nature. The funding status of each activity is reflected in Table 1. Administrative and financial activities without financial requirements (Activities 27-41) are not included.

The total funding sought under the BWP 2018-2019 is US\$9,870,000. Out of this amount, US\$1,840,000 has been approved under core operational costs through Decision 3(LIII). The remaining amount of US\$ 8,030,000 is divided into US\$7,830,000 sought from voluntary contributions and US\$200,000 from other sources. Activity 7 on Independent Market Monitoring (IMM) is fully funded by an EU Grant in the amount of Euro 4 million and is not included in the calculation of the contributions sought/received under this BWP.

At the time of preparing this report, voluntary contributions in the amount of US\$ 821,799 have been received, which is equivalent to 17.3% of the voluntary contributions sought in 2018 or 10.2% of the voluntary contributions sought for the biennium 2018/2019 (Table 2).

In terms of the funding status, eight activities are fully funded, including Activity 7(IMM) which is fully funded through an EU Grant and seven activities in Group 4 (Communications and outreach related work) and Group 5 (Analytical, statistical and other recurring work) which are financed from core voluntary contributions. Eight activities have received partial funding and 10 activities remain pending finance.

Status, Progress, Achievements:

A brief compilation of the progress made in 2018 and the achievements under each activity is given below. For a detailed account of the work done under each activity please refer to the respective activity in the Progress Report.

Group 1 – Field oriented activities with engagement of/work in member countries

- Activity 1 Incentives for green-growth value chain investments in tropical forests The Secretariat has been in close contact with the World Bank during 2018 and has agreed to use part of the funds made available under this activity to co-host a workshop on Fiscal Mechanisms for a Sustainable Forest Sector in Washington D.C. in late October 2018.
- Activity 2 Building legal and sustainable forest product supply chains Several workshops have been attended including on the possible establishment of a green supply chain platform and a Dialogue with Chinese Leading Timber Enterprises was co-organized by ITTO and CINFT/NFGA in Beijing, China in June 2018. An Initiative on Jointly Building the Global Green Supply Chain (GGSC) was launched on 22 June 2018 with the participation of 12 Chinese leading timber enterprises. A GGSC Promotion Committee has been established and a first meeting has been held with focus on the structure of the committee and a strategic road map.
- Activity 3 Strengthening participation of the private sector in the work of ITTO: industry-led legality compliance/due care training The Secretariat will collaborate with the World Resources Institute (WRI) to implement this activity. WRI has been working with the Global Timber Forum and FAO to undertake training for the Peruvian forest industry on complying with relevant market legality requirements. Funds will be used to extend this work to another ITTO producer country during 2019.

Activity 4 – Enhancing Teak Management An activity proposal seeking US\$ 1,236,250 and entitled 'Enhancing Conservation and Sustainable Management of Teak Forests and Legal and Sustainable Wood Supply Chains in the Greater Mekong Sub-region' has been formulated and submitted to the Federal Ministry of Food and Agriculture of Germany in July 2018. The proposal is currently under review. Any additional contributions to this activity will be used to extend the work to other tropical regions.

• Activity 6 – Enhance cooperation between ITTO and CITES

The Council will receive an update on the cooperation between ITTO and CITES under Item 10(a) of the Provisional Agenda.

• Activity 7 – Independent market monitoring of FLEGT-licensed timber

In January 2018 the IMM Project Steering Committee (PSC) approved a Work Plan, which featured several new activities. The IMM Annual Report 2017 was presented to the EU Commission in July 2018 and is expected to be published on the IMM website soon. Survey work undertaken by the IMM network of correspondents in seven key EU and two VPA partner countries has continued through 2018 and a special study of the EU furniture sector was completed in June 2018. The IMM furniture sector scoping study will be published in ITTO's Technical Series later this year. More special studies on key issues identified during the 2017 surveys will be undertaken starting in late 2018 and throughout 2019. The next IMM PSC meeting is scheduled to take place in February 2019.

Group 2 – Normative work on policy guidelines or other strategic work

Activity 10 – Developing and operationalizing ITTO's policy guidelines to members

- (a) Operationalize the ITTO Policy Guidelines on Gender Equality and Empowering Women (GEEW) In accordance with Decision 6 (LIII), the GEEW was posted on the ITTO website following its adoption at ITTC 53 in Lima, Peru and they were taken into consideration by the 53rd Expert Panel during the evaluation of project proposals. Also in accordance with the same decision, a panel led by CSAG in collaboration with TAG and assistance from the Secretariat will be part of the ITTC 54 schedule, focusing on the role of women in achieving ITTO's objectives, including constraints and opportunities.
- (b) ITTO has been engaged in analyzing Forest Landscape Restoration (FLR) programs of CPF members under the CPF Joint Initiative on FLR being implemented with GEF funds and a contract has been signed with IUCN to carry out the analysis of FLR programs of CPF members, facilitated by two consultants. ITTO introduced a concept note of revising the ITTO Restoration Guidelines into new FLR guidelines as a CPF product at the CPF meeting on 18 July 2018 during the 24th Session of the FAO Committee on Forestry (COFO 24). ITTO is organizing and Expert Group Meeting for FLR in the Tropics on 14-16 November 2018 in Bangkok, Thailand with financial support from Asia Forest Cooperation Organization (AFoCO) and logistical arrangement support from Royal Forest Department of Thailand.

Group 3 – Collaborative work/meetings with other organization/initiatives

• Activity 14 – Cooperation and consultation with the CPF, UNFF and others

ITTO participated in the 13th Session of the UNFF in May 2018 and the 24th Session of the FAO Committee on Forestry (COFO 24) in July 2018. ITTO collaboration with CPF members has been strengthened concerning forest landscape restoration and through the 'Sustainable Wood for a Sustainable World' (SW4SW) initiative adopted in May 2018 as a Joint Initiative of CPF. Participation is planned for the Workshop on Reporting on Global Forest Goals and targets of the UN Strategic Plan on Forests 2030 on 14-16 November 2018 at FAO HQ; Global Landscapes Forum Bonn on 1-2 December; and part of UNFCCC COP24 (3-14 Dec 2018, Katowice, Poland).

Group 4 – Communication and outreach-related work

• The activities under Group 4 have resulted in a broad range of publications, other products and accomplishments including the relaunch of the ITTO website with a fresh look and more intuitive navigation aimed at making it easier for users to find information. The Council will receive an update on Communications and Outreach related work under Item 10(c) of the Provisional Agenda.

Group 5 – Analytical, statistical and other recurring work

- Activity 19 Trade (TAG) and Civil Society (CSAG) Advisory Group involvement
 Assistance has been provided by the Secretariat for the participation of CSAG and TAG at the 54th
 ITTC.
- Activity 20 ITTO Annual Market Discussion
 In collaboration with TAG, the Annual Market Discussion 2018 will be held during the 54th ITTC on the theme 'Private Sector Tropical Timber Promotion Initiatives An Opportunity for Collaboration'.
- Activity 21 Expert Panel for the Technical Appraisal of Project Proposals The 53rd Expert Panel was convened in Yokohama, Japan on 9-13 July 2018. The report will be presented to the Joint Committees under Agenda Item 1 [Document ITTC/EP-53].

Activity 22 – ITTO Fellowship Programme The Council will receive the progress report on the implementation of the ITTO Fellowship Programme under Item 10(d)(1) of the Provisional Agenda [Document ITTC(LIV)/5] and the Fellowship Selection Panel will meet during the 54th ITTC and will make recommendations for awards under the Fellowship Cycle 2018 to the Council.

• Activity 23 - ITTO Market Information Service (MIS)

Twenty-three issues of the Tropical Timber Market Report (TTMR) are scheduled to be published in 2018.

• Activity 24 - Enhancement of statistical work and databases on statistics

ITTO participated in the meeting of the Inter-secretariat Working Group on Forest Statistics (IWGFS) held in Luxembourg on 22-23 Feb. 2017. The modification of the Joint Forest Sector Questionnaire (JFSQ) was the main topic of the meeting. The IWGFS agreed to exclude veneer from the wood based panel aggregate. In 2019, the IWGFS will be organized at ITTO headquarters in Yokohama.

 Activity 25 – Biennial review and assessment of the world timber situation The draft elements for the Biennial Review and Assessment of the World Timber Situation for 2017-2018 will be presented to and considered by the 54th ITTC.

Administrative and financial activities (no financial requirements)

Under this category, 15 activities have been approved. All activities are categorized as 'regular sessions work'.

The additional funding received as reported above, together with the final payment of US\$ 68,942 from the EU under the contract to implement the ITTO-CITES Program from 2012-16, has been pro-rated as appropriate and reflected in the totals at the top of this column.
