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PROGRESS REPORT ON THE IMPLEMENTATION OF THE ITTO BIENNIAL WORK PROGRAMME FOR 2018-2019

[Item 10(a) of the Provisional Agenda]

This document is prepared pursuant to Council Decision 2(LIII), which requested the Executive Director to report on the implementation status of the ITTO Biennial Work Programme (BWP) for the years 2018 and 2019. The document contains the activities as approved in Council Decision 2(LIII), however the columns on 'Relevance' and 'Responsible Body' have been replaced by the column on the 'Implementation Status'. For information on 'Relevance' and 'Responsible Body' please see Annex 1. For the detailed terms of reference of each activity, please refer to the BWP 2018-2019 as approved in Council Decision 2(LIII).

The Biennial Work Programme (BWP) 2018-2019 was adopted with Council Decision 2(LIII) and includes 41 activities divided into two parts. Part 1 includes 26 activities requiring financing through core budget, voluntary contributions or other sources. Part 2 includes 15 administrative and financial activities that do not require financing. With a view to provide a coherent structure, the activities under Part 1 have been categorized into the five groups according to their nature. The funding status of each activity is reflected in Table 1. Administrative and financial activities without financial requirements (Activities 27-41) are not included.

The total funding sought under the BWP 2018-2019 is US\$9,870,000. Out of this amount, US\$1,840,000 has been approved under core operational costs through Decision 3(LIII). The remaining amount of US\$ 8,030,000 is divided into US\$7,830,000 sought from voluntary contributions and US\$200,000 from other sources. Activity 7 on Independent Market Monitoring (IMM) is fully funded by an EU Grant in the amount of Euro 4 million and is not included in the calculation of the contributions sought/pledged under this BWP.

At the time of preparing this report, voluntary contributions in the amount of US\$5,420,733 have been pledged, i.e., US\$821,799 in 2018 and US\$4,598,934 in 2019 (see Table 2). The voluntary contributions pledged equal 67.5% of the voluntary contributions sought for the biennium 2018/2019. In 2019 more voluntary contributions were received than had been sought under this BWP, mainly due to two pledges from the Government of Germany, i.e. to Activity 2 (US\$2,390,000) and to Activity 5 (US\$1,236,390), in addition to pledges from China, EU, Japan, Korea, Netherlands and the USA. Contributions were also received from the International Union for Conservation of Nature, IUCN; the Program for the Promotion of Certified Forest Operations, PPECF and the Bali Partnership Fund. Contractual contributions were received from the World Bank and the CITES Secretariat. All contributions are summarized in Table 3.

In summary, out of the 26 activities requiring financing, seven activities are fully funded through core budget and one activity (Activity 7, IMM) is fully financed through an EU Grant. Two activities are fully funded through voluntary contributions, twelve activities have received partial funding and four activities remain pending finance.

Status, Progress, Achievements:

A brief summary of the status, progress made in the implementation and achievements of each activity is given below. A more detailed account is provided in the Progress Report below.

Group 1 - Field oriented activities with engagement of/work in member countries

Activity 1 – Incentives for green-growth value chain investments in tropical forests

The Secretariat collaborated with the World Bank and co-hosted a workshop on Fiscal Mechanisms for a Sustainable Forest Sector in Washington D.C. in late October 2018. Additional funding has been provided for full implementation of this activity as part of the Legal and Sustainable Supply Chains, LSSC pilot programme (see Activity 2).

Activity 2 – Building legal and sustainable forest product supply chains

The Government of Germany through the Federal Ministry of Food and Agriculture, BMEL has provided funding for implementation of five sub-activities in 2019/2020 as part of the Legal and Sustainable Supply Chain, LSSC pilot programme. The Council will receive an update on this activity under Item 10(a)(i) of the Provisional Agenda.

Activity 3 – Strengthening participation of the private sector in the work of ITTO: industry-led legality compliance/due care training

The Secretariat has been collaborating with the World Resources Institute (WRI) as well as the Global Timber Forum and FAO to undertake two training workshops for the Peruvian forest industry on complying with relevant market legality requirements in 2019. ITTO's funds will be used to extend this private sector training work to Guatemala during 2020.

Activity 4 – Enhancing Teak Management

Following the signature of the implementation agreement of this activity during the 54th ITTC in Yokohama, three workshops were held, 1) an inception workshop was held in Bangkok, Thailand, 23-25 April 2019; 2) a training workshop on teak propagation techniques and silviculture practices was held in Lampang, Thailand, 5-9 August 2019; and 3) a Mekong regional workshop for sustaining teak forests was held in Yangon, Myanmar, 27-29 September 2019 in collaboration with the Asia Forest Cooperation Organization (AFoCO) and with the support of Forest Department of Myanmar.

Activity 6 – Enhance cooperation between ITTO and CITES

The Council will receive an update on the cooperation between ITTO and CITES under Item 10(a)(ii) of the Provisional Agenda.

Activity 7 – Independent market monitoring of FLEGT-licensed timber

One of the new items approved under the IMM 2018 Work Plan was the IMM Trade Consultation workshops in key EU countries. Six of these workshops have now been completed in important European tropical timber markets. The IMM website was improved throughout 2018-2019 and now includes a data dashboard that enables user-friendly download and visualization of trade data. Further additions and improvements are planned. Survey work undertaken by the IMM network of correspondents in seven key EU and two VPA partner has continued through 2018-19 and several special studies were completed during the biennium; details are on the IMM website.

Activity 9 – Statistical capacity building workshops

FAO invited ITTO to participate to a national workshop on Forest products Statistics in Viet Nam which was co-organized by the Viet Nam Administration of Forestry (VNFOREST) and supported by the Forest Resources and Environment Center.

Group 2 - Normative work on policy guidelines or other strategic work

• Activity 10 - Developing and operationalizing ITTO's policy guidelines to members

- (a) A discussion panel led by CSAG, focusing on the role of women in achieving ITTO's objectives, including constraints and opportunities was held during the 54th ITTC. The Secretariat sponsored a preparatory meeting on the participation of Togolese women in collaboration with REFACOF in a follow-up panel during the 55th ITTC. CSAG has also been supported to participate at TICAD 7 in Yokohama, Japan to advocate the interests of women in the forestry sector.
- (b) The draft Guidelines for Forest Landscape Restoration in the Tropics [Document CRF(LIII)/4] will be presented to the Committee on Reforestation and Forest Management (CRF) under its Provisional Agenda Item 5(iii) during the 55th ITTC.

Group 3 - Collaborative work/meetings with other organization/initiatives

Activity 12 - Prevention and management of fire in tropical timber-producing forests

ITTO participated in the 7th IWFC "Facing Fire in a Changing World: Reducing Vulnerability of People and Landscapes by Integrated Fire Management" in Campo Grande, Brazil, 28 October - 1 November 2019. Assistance has been provided for the participation of five forest fire experts from Ghana, Indonesia, Panama, Peru, and Vietnam.

• Activity 14 - Cooperation and consultation with the CPF, UNFF and others

ITTO collaboration with CPF members has been strengthened concerning forest landscape restoration and through the 'Sustainable Wood for a Sustainable World' (SW4SW) initiative adopted in May 2018 as a Joint Initiative of CPF. ITTO participated in: the 13th UNFF, May 2018; the 24th FAO Committee on Forestry (COFO 24), July 2018; the Workshop on Reporting on Global Forest Goals and targets of the UN Strategic Plan on Forests 2030, 14-16 November 2018; the Global Landscapes Forum, Bonn, 1-2 December 2018 and the UNFCCC COP24, 3-14 December 2018, Katowice, Poland with a side event entitled "Restoring Degraded Tropical Forests: Reconciling carbon, biodiversity and community resilience". The Secretariat is planning to participate in COP25 and assist the participation of experts in CBD COP 15 in 2020 and related meetings to provide technical inputs to the Post 2020 Global Biodiversity Framework.

Group 4 – Communication and outreach-related work

The activities under Group 4 have resulted in a broad range of activities, publications or other products and accomplishments including the relaunch of the ITTO website with a fresh look and more intuitive navigation aimed at making it easier for users to find information.

Group 5 - Analytical, statistical and other recurring work

Activity 19 – Trade (TAG) and Civil Society (CSAG) Advisory Group involvement

Assistance has been provided by the Secretariat for the participation of CSAG and TAG at the 54th and 55th ITTC.

• Activity 20 – ITTO Annual Market Discussion

In collaboration with TAG, the Annual Market Discussion 2018 was be held during the 54th ITTC on the theme 'Private Sector Tropical Timber Promotion Initiatives – An Opportunity for Collaboration'. The 2019 Market Discussion on the theme "Added Value Processing in Africa - The Opportunities and Challenges" is being arranged in liaison with the TAG and will take place during the new "Trade and Markets Day" as part of the 55th ITTC.

Activity 21 – Expert Panel for the Technical Appraisal of Project Proposals

The 54th Expert Panel was convened in Yokohama, Japan on 24-28 June 2019. The report will be presented to the Joint Committees under JC Agenda Item 1 [Document ITTC/EP-54].

• Activity 22 – ITTO Fellowship Programme

The Council will receive the progress report on the implementation of the ITTO Fellowship Programme under Item 10(a)(iii)(1) of the Provisional Agenda [Document ITTC(LV)/5] and the Fellowship Selection Panel will meet during the 55th ITTC and will make recommendations for awards under the Fellowship Cycle 2019 to the Council.

Activity 23 - ITTO Market Information Service (MIS)

Twenty-three issues of the Tropical Timber Market Report (TTMR) have been published in 2018 and another twenty-three issues are planned to be published in 2019.

Activity 24 - Enhancement of statistical work and databases on statistics

The 2019 IWGFS was organized at ITTO headquarters in Yokohama. The main topic was presenting the results of the Forest products conversion factors study conducted by ITTO, UNECE and FAO. Final results will be displayed and published in 2020. ITTO's online statistical database was optimized and expanded in 2019 to cover world primary and secondary processed wood products production and trade since 1990.

• Activity 25 - Biennial review and assessment of the world timber situation

The draft elements for the Biennial Review and Assessment of the World Timber Situation for 2017-2018 were presented to and considered by the 54th ITTC. The Biennial Review and Assessment of the World Timber Situation 2017-2018 was published in September 2019 and complemented with an analysis of the Japanese timber market undertaken by the Japan Wood-products Information and Research Center (JAWIC).

Administrative and financial activities (no financial requirements)

Under this category, 15 activities have been approved. All activities are categorized as 'regular sessions work'.

6. Enhance cooperation between ITTO and CITES

Continue to assist Members to implement CITES listings of timber species. Pursuant to Decision 5(XLVI) on "Multi-Donor Mechanism to Facilitate Enhanced Cooperation between ITTO and CITES", ITTO successfully completed implementation of a second grant of approximately US\$6,200,000 (EUR5,000,000) from the European Union (through the European Commission) in 2016. Matching contributions from other donors of over US\$3,000,000 were received by ITTO during the four-year EU/EC grant period. While the EU/EC in 2016 decided to provide further funding for work on CITES-listed tree species directly to the CITES Secretariat, other ITTO donors are encouraged to continue to support ITTO's CITES-related work through this activity.

ITTO contributions: US\$600,000

ITTO signed contracts with the CITES Secretariat to receive funds totaling US\$ 576,483 under the CITES Tree Species Program (CTSP) through 2020. These contracts define ITTO's assistance to CITES in implementing the CTSP, including: reviewing proposals submitted by ITTO members; convening 3 regional meetings (two of which –for Asia and Latin America – were convened in 2018 with the Africa meeting in March 2019); participating in the CTSP advisory committee; and supporting implementation of projects in ITTO member countries once they commence towards the end of 2019.

ITTO also continues to assist member countries in implementing CITES listings of tropical tree species outside of the CTSP. In this regard ITTO co-hosted a workshop with the government of Madagascar in June 2018 to discuss and finalize a business plan for dealing with stockpiles of rosewood that exist in the country. ITTO received funds totaling US\$ 40,000 from the World Bank as a partial contribution to the costs of this workshop, the results of which were reported to the CITES Standing Committee in October 2018. ITTO has also signed an agreement with the government of Madagascar in 2019 to fund a pilot activity to inventory and mark rosewood stockpiles, supporting the implementation of one important element of an action plan submitted by Madagascar to CITES.

In addition, the ITTO Secretariat continued to actively participate in relevant CITES fora in 2019, including the 18th Conference of Parties and Standing Committee in August. ITTO will organize the fifth meeting of the CTSP Advisory Committee in conjunction with the Fifty-fifth Session of the ITTC in December 2019.

The additional funding received from CITES as reported above, together with the final payment of US\$ 68,942 received from the EU in 2018 under the contract to implement the ITTO-CITES Program from 2012-16, and additional voluntary contributions from the USA, have been pro-rated as appropriate and reflected in the totals at the top of this column.

Incentives for green-growth value chain investments in tropical forests

- The initial analysis of two countries summary of key lessons is ongoing in the Republic of Congo and in Gabon:
- Contracts have been signed with the lead consultant (who will also carry out the Africa case study) and the consultants who will carry out the supply-demand gap study; contracts have been finalized and sent to the consultants who will carry out the Asian and Latin American case studies;
- Demand-supply gap analysis with a global view and specific conclusions in selected lead markets important for the case countries (forest economist/econometrician sub-contracted) is underway;
- In-country preparation of case studies (country experts' review and interviews on incentives; preparations of case narratives) is underway in the Republic of Congo and in Gabon;

Supporting the establishment and operation of the Global Legal and Sustainable Supply Chain (LSSC) Platform

- The International Forum "Together towards Global Green Supply Chains a Forest Products Industry Initiative" was held on 22–25 October 2019 in Shanghai and Huzhou, China. Around 350 participants from government agencies, international organizations, industry associations, and private sector enterprises attended this conference and related events.
- Main outputs of this forum included an initiative on Building a GGSC Collaboration Network, a MoU
 between UFIGA and UFIAG of Gabon for legality and sustainability verification within a three-year
 period, establishment of an international entrepreneurs' expert team, etc.
- The establishment of the Business Information Exchange Platform has commenced, including building of the LSSC-GGSC website, initiating the GGSC expert panel, designing and preparing for the business information exchange index, etc.
- During the Shanghai Forum a meeting was held with the Global Timber Tracking Network, GTTN
 discussing the coordination of GTTN Phase III from 2020 onwards and the possible integration of
 GTTN as a key component of the GGSC platform under the LSSC programmatic line.

Promotion of smallholders' forest landscape restoration in West Africa

- Six national consultants are conducting country studies under the guidance of the international lead consultant, Professor Jürgen Blaser, Bern University of Applied Sciences;
- The lead consultant and his team have collected FLR policies and successful FLR case stories in the region for comprehensive analysis and assessment of the scalable solutions and good organizational practices;
- A regional workshop on sustainable development of smallholder FLR plantations in West Africa is organized in collaboration with the Office for Forest Development and Exploitation, ODEF, Togo and will be held 27 - 29 November 2019, in Lomé, Togo prior to the 55th ITTC.

From rosewood stockpiles towards legal and sustainable management of supply chains in Madagascar

 Discussions commenced in 2019 with the government of Madagascar (Ministry of Environment, Ecology and Forests) on a work program to utilize \$300,000 made available by the government of Germany (BMEL) for the activity "From Rosewood Stockpiles Towards Legal And Sustainable Management Of Supply Chains In Madagascar" under the LSSC BWP activity.

Development of training curricula for Central African countries on legal and sustainable supply chains

 The survey for the identification of relevant stakeholders to be involved in the sensitization campaigns on legal and sustainable supply chains (LSSC) was undertaken in five countries in the Congo Basin (Cameroon, Central African Republic, Congo-Brazzaville, Congo-Kinshasa and Gabon) by the RIFFEAC Secretariat in collaboration with four consultants selected for the formulation of the abovementioned training curricula, through the circulation of the e-version of a questionnaire on LSSC-related issues to relevant stakeholders. The data and information collected through the survey are under review;

- The inception regional workshop dealing with the sensitization and awareness on legal and sustainable supply chains (LSSC) in relation to forest governance in Congo Basin countries workshop was held 14-15 October 2019, Douala, Cameroon;
- In terms of the preparation of modules on legal and sustainable supply chains, four consultants prepared a draft document regarding the methodology to be used for preparation of four training modules. The draft documents were discussed during the inception regional workshop.
