Part I - Background & timeline



- 2016 (Nov) - CRF approved ESIA Guidelines & recommended implementation on a pilot basis
- 2018 (Nov)- CRF recommended ESIA GLs be amended to address implementation problems, including time/cost of assessment process
- 2019 (June) - Expert Panel suggests clearer objectives, more efficient process & better linkage between Checklist and ESS requirements

Part 1 – Consultants



Terms of Reference

- Augusts 2019 ITTO engaged to consultants to:
 - Streamline 2016 ESIA GLs to address problems in user-friendly manner
 - Clarify risk assessment process
 - Build on guidance already in Project Manual
 - Take into account GEEW Policy Guidelines (2017)
 - Take into account ES processes used by FAO & IUCN

Part 1 - Recent process & timeline



- August-Sept: Consultants and Secretariat prepare draft “ITTO ESM GLs”
- 11 Sept: ED circulated draft ESM GLs to ITTO Members, inviting comments by 1 Oct
- Mid-Oct: Responses received from Guyana, Mexico & USA and consultants revise draft GLs accordingly
- Late Oct: Final draft ESM GLs posted on ITTO website

Part 2 - How do draft ESM GLs refine/amend 2016 ESIA GLs?



- Broader title (ITTO ESM Guidelines) to better reflect nature of GLs which include ESIA as 1 part of assessment process
- Streamlined Section I: Introduction
- Streamlined Section II: ESM Policy & Principles:
 - 4 objectives
 - Scope of application (ITTO field projects)
 - Users (Members, Secretariat, Expert Panel) and
 - 5 guiding principles (same as 2016 but more focused & linked to SDGs/GFGs)

Part 2 - How do draft ESM GLs refine/amend 2016 ESIA GLs?



Section III
ESM Standards
and
Requirements

- Sections III & IV reversed for more logical presentation (III = ESSs, IV = assessment process)
- Section III:
 - Reduces ESS's from 8 to 7
 - Consolidates some ESS's
 - Introduces new ESS's
 - Clarifies ESS requirements: content and presentation

➤ Section III ESS's:

ESS 1 - Stakeholder engagement (new)

ESS 2 - Gender analysis (new)

ESS 3 - Biodi & ecosystem services

ESS 4 - Climate change mitigation & adaptation

ESS 5 - SFM natural tropical forests (new)

ESS 6 - Restoration & rehabilitation of degraded tropical forest landscapes

ESS 7 – Forest product production & processing (wood & non-wood)

➤ ESS 1-4 are cross-cutting

Risk & Impact Assessment Process

- Three risk categories
(Same with 2016 ESIA GLs):
 - **A = high risk proposals**
 - **B = medium risk**
 - **C = low/no risk**

- ES assessment process has been streamlined/clarified; draws on FAO & IUCN ES processes

Risk & Impact Assessment Process

Step 1 – “ES Screening”

- All field project proposals are screened to get an initial risk assessment using expanded ES Checklist (Annex 2)
- Based on the completed checklist, proponent assigns the proposal a risk category (A B or C)

Step 2 – “ES Assessment” based on risk category

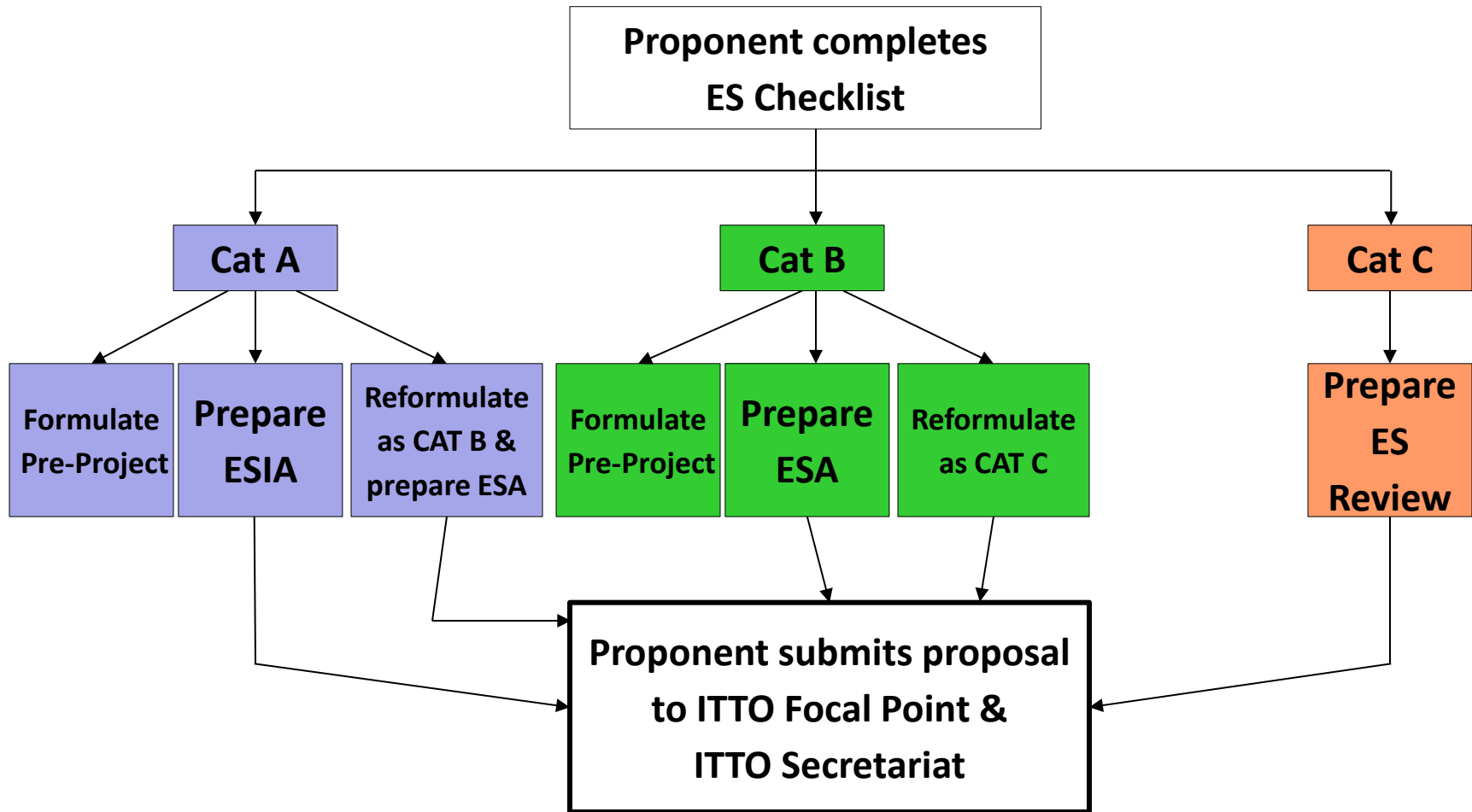

Risk & Impact Assessment Process

- There are 3 levels of ES assessment corresponding to risk category:
 - Cat C (low risk): Requires an **ES review** consistent with ITTO Project Formulation Manual
 - Annex A (GLs for stakeholders participation)
 - Annex B (GLs for environmental impact of projects)
 - Cat B (medium risk): Requires an **ES Analysis (ESA)** per Annex 3
 - Cat A (high risk): Requires an **ES Impact Assessment (ESIA)** per Annex 3 (to be prepared internally or externally)



ES Screening and Assessment Process (Fig 1)



Option: Proponents may reformulate Cat A or B proposals to reduce risks

ITTO projects - Low risk to date

- Of 1000+ projects, pre-projects & activities funded by ITTO:
 - Most were small-scale (less than USD1 mil) and **low** ES risk
 - A few were **medium** ES risk
 - None were **high** ES risk
- Likely to continue but useful to show that the ITTO ESM process can address the range of potential risk categories (A B C)

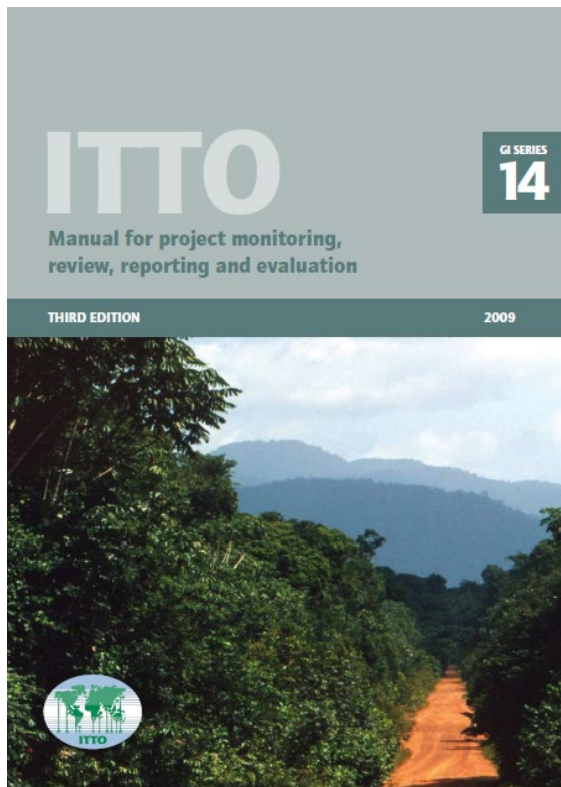

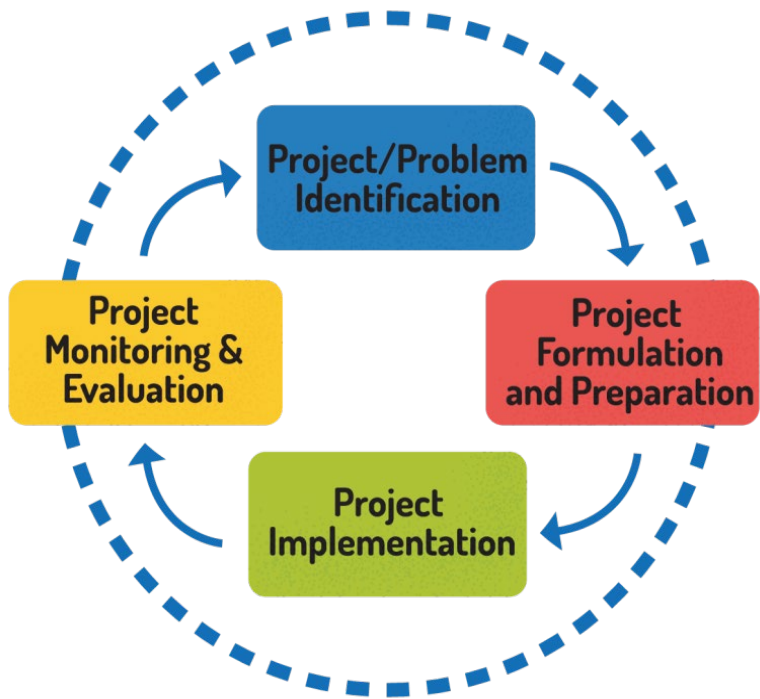
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Risk & Impact Assessment Process



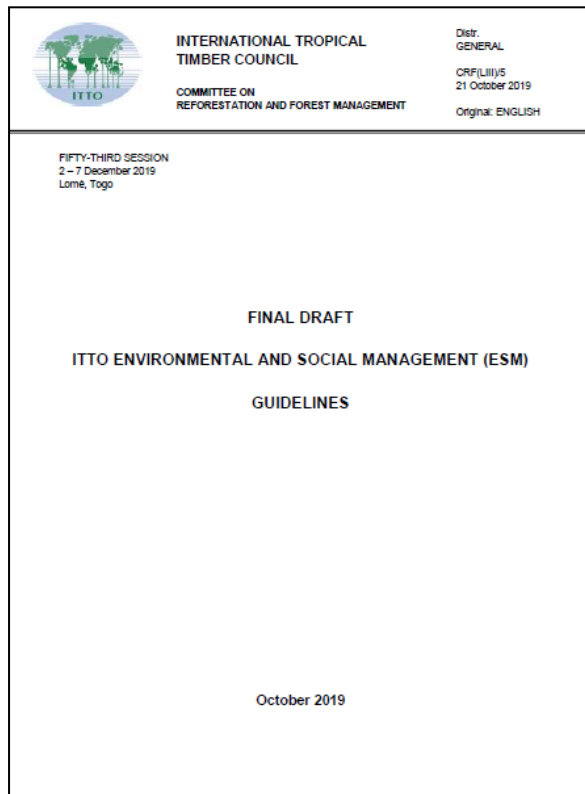
- Step 3: ITTO Focal Point submits proposal to Secretariat with ES Review, ESA or ESIA
- Step 4: Regular ITTO proposal review process kicks in:
 - Screening by Secretariat
 - Appraisal by Expert Panel
 - Review by Committee
 - Approval by Council
 - Funding by donors
- Steps 5 & 6: Implementation, M&E (per ITTO Monitoring & Evaluation Manual, ESM GLs)

Streamlined approach to ITTO project cycle



- ITTC 55 will consider piloting the financial WG proposal to make several changes to ITTO project cycle
- Features proposed include:
 - Developing project “concept notes” as 1st step in proposal formulation
 - “Co-development” of full project proposals with interested donors
- Envisions changes to project appraisal/ review process (Section IV)
- Cores of ESM GLs remain (Role of the Secretariat ↑)

3. Recommendations: Points for consideration

- Advise on future work of the Committee/ Council on implementation and improvement of the ESM GLs
