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PROGRESS REPORT ON THE IMPLEMENTATION OF THE ITTO BIENNIAL WORK PROGRAMME FOR 2021-2022

[Item 14 of the Provisional Agenda]

This document is prepared pursuant to Council Decision 2(LVI), which requested the Executive Director to report on the implementation status of the ITTO Biennial Work Programme (BWP) for the years 2021 and 2022. Following the introductory section, the document contains the activities as approved in Council Decision 2(LVI) in the same tabular format, but the columns on 'Relevance' and 'Responsible Body' have been replaced by the column on the 'Implementation Status'.

The Reference Table showing the relevance of each activity to objectives/goals of the International Tropical Timber Agreement, ITTA; the Strategic Action Plan, SAP; the Global Forest Goals, GFG and to the Programme Lines is included in Annex I. Annex I also includes information on 'Relevance' and 'Responsible Body' for each activity.

For the detailed terms of reference of each activity, please refer to the BWP 2021-2022 as approved in Council Decision 2(LVI).

The Secretariat is proposing an extension of the BWP 2021-2022 for one year through 2023, so that the timing of the BWP is back in line with the financial biennium of the administrative budget.

The Biennial Work Programme (BWP) 2021-2022, was adopted with Council Decision 2(LVI). It includes 40 activities divided into two parts. Part 1 includes 24 activities requiring financing through voluntary contributions, core budget, or other sources. The activities under Part 1 have been categorized into five groups according to their nature. Part 2 includes 16 administrative and financial activities that do not require financing. In September 2021 one additional activity was included in Part 2, i.e., Activity 41, to facilitate the secondment of a Programme Officer from the Government of Korea, financed by the Korean Forest Service. The financing status of the activities under Part 1 is reflected in Table 1.

The total funding sought under the BWP 2021-2022 is US\$6,206,760, including US\$1,860,000 approved under core operational costs. US\$4,346,760 is sought from voluntary contributions. Activity 6 on Independent Market Monitoring (IMM) is fully funded by an EU Grant of Euro 4 million and is not included in the calculation of the contributions sought/pledged under this BWP. At the time of preparing this report, voluntary contributions in the amount of US\$3,953,870 have been pledged (see Table 2).

Due to the shortfall in members' payments of their assessed contributions to the administrative account the activities approved under core budget are indicated as partially funded. Based on the status of the administrative account at the time of preparing this report, the expected shortfall in contributions to the core budget for 2022 is about US\$ 131,000 or 14.1%. In 2021, due to the shortfall in timely payments to the administrative account, the production of TFU had to be put on hold and the MIS correspondents had to be asked to delay scheduled payments for the period from end of May to mid-August 2021.

In 2021-22 (to September) voluntary contributions to the BWP 2021-2022 were received from Japan, USA, China and the Netherlands. Contributions were also received from the CITES Secretariat, FAO, Soka Gakkai, the Precious Forest Foundation, Kisso-an and the Macao Trade and Investment Promotion Institute (IPIM). This report also includes one additional activity, Activity 41 'Facilitation of the Secondment of a Programme Officer from the Government of Korea'. This activity is a cooperation agreement under the MoU between the Korea Forest Service (KFS) and ITTO to enhance cooperation between KFS and ITTO through the secondment of a Programme Manager. The Programme Manager (Mr. Taesik Ham) has been seconded for the period from September 2021 to September 2024. The secondment is fully financed by KFS through a voluntary contribution of KRW 1.23 billion or approximately US\$ 1 million. This contribution is not included in the calculation of the contributions sought/pledged under this BWP. The voluntary contributions pledged to date are summarized in Table 3.

In summary, out of the 24 activities requiring financing, two activities (Activities 10 & 15) have received full funding under the previous BWP and one activity is funded through an EU Grant (Activity 6). Out of the remaining activities, two activities (Act. 2 - LSSC; Act. 5 – ITTO/CITES) have received full funding, 15 activities (including six activities approved under core budget) have received partial funding and 4 activities remain pending finance. Two activities funded from core budget also received voluntary contributions for additional components, i.e., Activity 17(a) and Activity 23.

Status, Progress, Achievements:

A brief summary of the status, progress and achievements of activities that have received partial or full financing under this BWP is given below. A more detailed account is provided in the Progress Report table.

Group 1 - Field oriented activities with engagement of/work in member countries

Activity 1 – Incentives for green-growth value chain investments in tropical forests

The Secretariat signed a contract with FAO in 2021 to extend the work carried out under Activity 2 of the previous BWP on a global study of supply-demand gaps for tropical timber to all timber. This extended study was published by FAO in July 2022. Reporting was also completed to finalize the activity funded by the government of Germany (BMEL) reported under Activity 2 of the previous BWP. This included publication of TS 48 "Fiscal and non-fiscal incentives for sustainable forest management" and TS 49 "Tropical timber 2050", both available in all official languages on www.itto.int.

Activity 2 – Building legal and sustainable forest product supply chains

This activity is part of the Legal and Sustainable Supply Chain (LSSC) pilot programme. It has received funding from the Germany, Japan, USA, China, Macao Trade and Investment Promotion Institute (IPIM) and FAO. In total, US\$ 2,484,798 has been received for the different components as indicated in the Progress Report below. No funding has been received for the GTTN Phase III component.

The sub-activities funded by the government of Germany (BMEL) reported under Activity 2 were completed by the end of 2021 and relevant reports were submitted and finalized. These sub-activities include: 2.1 a. "Supporting the establishment of the Business Information Exchange Platform"; 2.1 b. "Study of the Blockchain-based International Timber Tracking System for Building Sustainable Wood Supply Chains"; and 2.1 c. "Timber Trade Portal: Towards well-informed legal trade".

The Special Activity PP-A/53-323 funded by the Forestry Agency of Japan, on Capacity building for the implementation of "Legal and Sustainable Supply Chains (LSSC) by stakeholders in the Congo Basin countries (sub-activity 2.4), is to be reported in detail in Document CRF(LVI)/3 under agenda item 10.3 dealing with BWP-based Activities.

There are two new sub-activities under Activity 2 that have been approved by ITTO and fully funded by Macao Trade and Investment Promotion Institute (IPIM) of Macao SAR, China in mid-2022, namely 2.10 "Supporting the Establishment and Operation of the Global Timber Index Platform for Building Legal and Sustainable Forest Products Supply Chains" and 2.11 "Supporting Pilot Collaborative Operation of the Blockchain-based Timber Traceability System (BTTS) for Building Legal and Sustainable Forest Products Supply Chains". The implementation of these two sub-activities has only recently commenced and they will be continued in 2023 and beyond. A progress report on the implementation will be provided to ITTC 59.

 Activity 3 – Strengthening participation of the private sector in the work of ITTO: industry-led legality compliance/due care training

During 2022, work in Guatemala begun under the previous BWP was completed. Consultations are underway with WRI and other partners with respect to proposals to extend the private sector training to one or more additional countries in 2022, with Guyana the focus of current discussions. Additional funding is required to extend training activities to any other countries. This activity is expected to be continued into 2023 and beyond.

• Activity 5 - Enhance cooperation between ITTO and CITES

ITTO finalized a contract with the CITES Secretariat in 2021 to provide assistance to the CITES Tree Species Programme (CTSP). This contract provides ITTO with US\$ 400,538 to: i) carry out a study on agarwood producing species and organize a validation workshop to review the study; ii) co-organize an international training workshop on timber identification; iii) assist, advise and provide input to the mid-term

and final review of the CTSP; and iv) participate in the meetings of the CTSP Advisory Committee. ITTO will also fund a project on sustainable management of mahogany in Ecuador under this activity as a contribution to the CTSP. All of the above activities were under implementation in 2022, with a final report to be submitted to the CITES Secretariat covering all work under the contract by November 2022.

ITTO also continues to assist member countries in implementing CITES listings of tropical tree species outside of the CTSP with support from other donors (the USA pledged an additional US\$200,000 to this activity for 2021-22). This work includes:

- A project in Madagascar to support implementation of the use plan and monitoring/tracking of rosewood stockpiles (agreement signed, project team in place; tracking systems being evaluated);
- A project in Cameroon in collaboration with University of Adelaide (Australia) to implement DNA tracking and verification tests in supply chains of *Prunus africana* and *Pericopsis elata* (agreements signed with University of Adelaide and government of Cameroon; first workshop in Cameroon convened in August 2021; sample collection being planned);
- The project in Ecuador referred to above that will be considered as a contribution to the CTSP.

All three of the above projects should complete activities in the first half of 2023. ITTO continues to seek additional funding from donors for this activity since demand for support in implementing CITES provisions for tropical tree species from member countries remains strong. This activity is expected to be continued into 2023 and beyond.

Activity 6 – Independent market monitoring of FLEGT-licensed timber (IMM)

IMM activities in 2022 continued to be affected by the COVID pandemic, which made international travel difficult. Some travel within Europe and to Indonesia took place during the first half of the year, but travel activities were reduced again in the second half, due to travel related COVID infections among the team and chaotic travel conditions caused by staff shortages at European airports.

The Project Steering Committee Meeting, which had been planned by IMM for March 2021, had to be postponed due to the COVID pandemic and was rescheduled several times, with the current planning for a final PSC in late 2022. The IMM Work Plan to complete this activity will be discussed during that meeting. The IMM 2021 and 2022 Work Plans were approved as a part of the IMM Progress Reports for 2020 and 2021 that were submitted to the EU in December 2020 and 2021, respectively.

As the IMM project is scheduled to complete activities in December 2022, the focus of the Work Plan for the year has shifted towards activities under Result 3 "A long-term strategy for sustaining the Independent Market Monitoring system beyond this project is defined in consultation with the EU and VPA partner countries".

Government, private sector, and CSO stakeholders in Indonesia were consulted on the IMM's past, ongoing, and potential future activities and operational structure in three separate sessions on 17 and 18 May 2022 in Jakarta. A consultation of European private sector, NGOs, and consultancies was held on 1 June 2022, during the Carrefour International du Bois trade show in Nantes. Feedback from trade and FLEGT/EUTR Competent Authorities in key EU countries is also being sought as a part of the annual IMM survey.

From among the remaining VPA partner countries, IMM will also consult stakeholders in Ghana and Viet Nam, which are widely considered most likely to be the next countries to start FLEGT-licensing in the foreseeable future. The IMM Ghana correspondent has already interviewed several key timber exporters in Ghana for the IMM feedback survey. Stakeholders from government agencies and CSOs were consulted in two separate webinars on 18 August 2022. Similar consultations in Viet Nam are planned in the fourth quarter of the year.

Other IMM activities, such as market updates and newsletters, also continued during 2022. The IMM 2022 Work Plan provides for production of four "modular" reports (rather than a single Annual Report as prepared for 2021) covering trade and market updates, feedback from the stakeholder consultations, and trade survey results. These are to be published between April 2022 and April 2023. This new reporting format was developed in response to feedback that the Annual Reports were not accessible enough and published at rather long intervals. The first Modular Report was published in May 2022, with the second one scheduled for publication in September, a third in December and a final one in April or May 2023.

This activity will be completed by June 2023 and a report on its successful completion will be provided to the 59th ITTC.

Activity 7 - Monitor progress in the application of criteria and indicators for sustainable forest management

(b) Adapting the 2016 ITTO Criteria and Indicators (C&I) for SFM to African context ITTO signed a special services agreement (SSA) with an international consultant and a regional consultant for the implementation of this BWP Activity referenced as PP-A/55-336. The consultants prepared a draft background document which was reviewed by the ITTO Secretariat and was subject to technical validation during a regional workshop from 28-30 September 2021, attended by ITTO Focal Points from ITTO member countries in Africa and representatives of relevant forest-related stakeholders. The final version of the revised/adapted C&I are currently undergoing translation with final editing, layout/design and publication to be complete by the end of 2022. PP-A/55-336 is to be reported in Document CRF(LVI)/3 under the CRF agenda item 5.(v).

Activity 8 – Statistical capacity building workshops

The purpose of this activity is to strengthen capacities in statistical reporting (i.e., the Joint Forest Sector Questionnaire). Due to the pandemic situation and the uncertainty it generated, no physical statistical workshop could be organized in 2022.

The next regional workshop to be considered is planned to be organized physically in Latin America in 2023 depending on the Covid situation. This activity is expected to continue into 2023 and beyond.

Activity 9 - Prevention and management of fire in tropical timber-producing forests

a) PP-A/56-340-1 (Indonesia) and PP-A/56-340-2 (Peru) are to be reported in detail in Document CRF(LVI)/2 under the CRF agenda item 8.3 dealing with BWP-based Activities.

Group 2 - Normative work on policy guidelines or other strategic work

Activity 10 - Formulate a new Strategic Action Plan

A total of four Working Group meetings were held in the preparation of a draft Strategic Action Plan 2022-2026, supported by Secretariat and two consultants. The WG Report and the Proposed Strategic Action Plan 2022-2026 were presented to Council at its 57th session and adopted under Decision 5(LVII).

- Activity 11 Developing and operationalizing ITTO's policy guidelines to members

 (a) Operationalizing ITTO Policy guidelines on gender equality and empowering women

 ITTO's Policy Guidelines on Gender Equality and Empowering of Women have been incorporated since
 2019 into the project formulation process by members submitting project proposals through the Regular

 Project Cycle where these guidelines need to be taken into consideration. Project submissions evaluated
 by the ITTO Expert Panel ensure that these guidelines are referred to/considered in proposals being
 submitted. The same approach is taken with the new concept note approach as of December 2020 and
 considered where applicable. ITTO is in discussion with collaborating partners on the organization of an
 international workshop on The Role of Women in the Forest Sector (including primary processing) in 2023,
 pending further funding being made available.
 - (b) Disseminating the ITTO Guidelines for Forest Landscape Restoration (FLR) in the Tropics The 'Guidelines for FLR in the Tropics' were developed by ITTO in collaboration with many partners including AFoCO, CIFOR, FAO, IUCN and IUFRO under a joint initiative of the Collaborative Partnership on FLR. In these Guidelines, the six principles of FLR are presented into 32 guiding elements to put FLR into effect in the field. ITTO seeks to encourage the use of these voluntary guidelines to apply them as a reference and guiding document in the development of FLR interventions at the national and subnational levels as well as in making finance available for FLR; and to promote their use as a vehicle for increasing capacity in tropical countries to undertake FLR, in combination with other specific guidelines, tools and approaches. The activity aims to promote the use of the new FLR guidelines at the national and subnational levels in all three tropical regions, to contribute to the successful design, planning, implementation and monitoring of FLR interventions in ITTO members. Two virtual meetings for the dissemination of the FLR guidelines were organized in August and September 2021 for Asia-Pacific and Latin America, with a third scheduled for the first half of 2023 for Africa. This activity is to be reported in detail in Document CRF(LVI)/3 under CRF agenda item 5 (policy work).
 - (c) Support for women's groups with gender empowerment and forest landscape restoration in Togo The pilot project PP-A/56-341 (Support for women's groups with gender empowerment and forest landscape restoration in Togo), is to be reported in detail in Document CRF(LVI)/3 under CRF agenda item 8.3 dealing with BWP-based Activities.

Group 3 - Collaborative work/meetings with other organization/initiatives

• Activity 12 - Conservation and sustainable use of biodiversity in tropical timber production forests. The MOU between ITTO and CBD was renewed in February 2021 and both Secretariats are currently exploring activities of mutual interest to operationalize the MOU in support of the implementation of tropical forest-related goals and targets of the Post-2020 Global Biodiversity Framework. A joint ITTO-CBD side event, in cooperation with the Amazon Cooperation Treaty Organization (ACTO) and the Network of Central African Forestry and Environmental Training Institutions (RIFFEAC), is being planned for the second part of COP15 in Montreal, Canada in December 2022 to share the outcome of the ITTO/CBD Collaborative Initiative for Tropical Forest Biodiversity

Activity 13 – Cooperation and consultation with the CPF, UNFF and others

All cooperation and consultation with CPF members and select individual CPF members in 2021 have been conducted virtually because of the ongoing COVID-19 exigencies in place. ITTO contributed and actively participated in the following forums in 2022:

- The Working Party on Commodities (PROBA).
- APEC Meeting of Ministers Responsible for Forestry (MMRF5).
- 21st and 22nd meetings of the APEC Experts Group on Illegal Logging and Associated Trade (EGILAT).
- 8th Tokyo International Conference on African Development (TICAD 8).
- 2022 High-level Political Forum on Sustainable Development.
- 19th Congo Basin Forest Partnership (CBFP) meeting of the Parties.
- ATIBT Biennial Forum, General Assembly and 70th anniversary at Carrefour International du Bois.
- United Nations Forum on Forests (17th Session).
- XV World Forestry Congress.
- 26th session of the Committee on Forestry (COFO) and 8th World Forestry Week.

Later in 2022, ITTO plans to participate in the upcoming Nature for Life Hub (UNDP); and the CBD, CITES and UNFCCC COPs.

Activity 14 – Collaboration on criteria and indicators for SFM

ITTO contributed to the finalization of the FAO FRA 2020 report and continued to collaborate with FAO during 2022, including co-hosting a side event on the contribution of C&I to SFM at the World Forestry Congress in Seoul, Korea in May 2022.

ITTO will continue to collaborate with relevant international C&I processes and will continue to serve on the FAO FRA Advisory Board. This activity is expected to continue into 2023 and beyond.

Group 4 - Communication and outreach-related work

Activities 15 – 17

Activities in Group 4 have resulted in a broad range of communication products, such as publications, videos, newsletters, social media posts, exhibitions and website updates, as well as participation in various webinars and other international events. The Council welcome the draft communication strategy (presented to the Council at its 57th session (Document ITTC(LVII)/16)), as an ambitious plan to improve ITTO's visibility and messaging and support its fundraising efforts, noting that additional resources would be needed for its implementation. Progress on implementation of the strategy is described the table below. The use of electronic communications (e.g., website, e-newsletters, social media and webinars) has increased substantially as a result of the pandemic. The shortfall in members' contributions to the administrative budget affected the Organization's outreach work in 2021, for example by causing the temporary suspension of the Tropical Forest Update (TFU) (work on the TFU recommenced in mid-August 2021). The cost of producing the TFU increased in 2022 due to increases in printing and shipping as a side-effect of the COVID-19 pandemic and shipping bottlenecks. The Secretariat found ways to reduce cost for now, but a budget revision may be needed at the time of approval of the next BWP if the situation remains

Group 5 - Analytical, statistical and other recurring work

ITTC. This activity is expected to continue into 2023 and beyond.

- Activity 18 Trade (TAG) and Civil Society (CSAG) Advisory Group involvement
 Due to the 57th ITTC being held virtually, no travel assistance was required for TAG/CSAG involvement in
 Council work in 2021. Funding has been provided to support attendance of TAG and CSAG at the 58th
- Activity 19 ITTO Annual Market Discussion

With travel still difficult/impossible in 2021, the Secretariat collaborated with TAG in the preparation and conduct of the 2021 Market Discussion which was held virtually on the theme "Challenges of the Covid-19 pandemic" in conjunction with the virtual Fifty-seventh Session of ITTC. The TAG plans to convene the 2022 Market Discussion on the theme "Carbon markets and the timber industry: an opportunity for a paradigm shift?" which will take place in conjunction with the 58th ITTC Session, scheduled to be physically convened on 7-11 November 2022. This activity is expected to continue into 2023 and beyond.

• Activity 20 - Expert Panel for the Technical Appraisal of Project Proposals

Due to COVID-19 the 57th Expert Panel was conducted electronically. The report will be presented to the Joint Committees under Agenda Item 1 [Document ITTC/EP-57]. This activity is expected to continue into 2023 and beyond.

Activity 21 – ITTO Fellowship Programme

The Fellowship Selection Panel will meet during the Fifty-eighth Session of the Council and will make recommendations for awards under the Fellowship Cycle 2022 to the Council. The Report of the Fellowship Selection Panel (Document ITTC/LVIII)/8) including the progress report on the implementation of the ITTO Fellowship Programme, will be presented to the Council as part of the presentation of the BWP progress report. This activity is expected to continue into 2023 and beyond.

Activity 22 - ITTO Market Information Service (MIS)

Twenty-three issues of the Tropical Timber Market Report (TTMR) were published in 2021 and the same number are on schedule to be delivered in 2022. All correspondents continue working and as of August 2022 have managed to deliver their reports on time despite ongoing pandemic disruptions in many countries. The report is distributed to over 18,000 registered readers and further disseminated by many of these readers. This activity is expected to continue into 2023 and beyond.

Activity 23 - Enhancement of statistical work and databases on statistics

In 2022, the Inter-secretariat Working Group on Forest Statistics (IWGFS) meeting was held online. Main topics discussed were the continuous improvement of the Joint Forest Sector Questionnaire by updating definitions of certain products, increasing the response rates, the inclusion of new products in the next review of the World Customs Organization Harmonized System and reviewing common statistical activities undertaken with partner organizations. The next meeting will be held virtually in January 2023.

The ITTO online statistical database was updated twice in 2022 (February and August) with the most current production and trade figures for primary wood products and for the trade of secondary wood products covering the period 1990-2021 uploaded. The next updates will be in February 2023 and August 2023 covering the period 1990-2022. This activity is expected to continue into 2023 and beyond.

• Activity 24 - Biennial review and assessment of the world timber situation

The draft of the Biennial Review and Assessment of the World Timber Situation 2021-2022 is being prepared in 2022 and will be presented to the 58th ITTC. Following Council input, further data collection, analysis and editing, the Biennial Review 2021-22 will be published in 2023 for distribution ahead of ITTC 59.

A long-term study on the consumption and trade of tropical primary and secondary wood products is currently co-funded under this activity and will be published with the Biennial Review and Assessment of the World Timber Situation 2021-2022. A second study on wood processing conversion factors in Africa will be commissioned in early 2023 and if completed in time will also be published with the Biennial Review and Assessment of the World Timber Situation 2021-2022. More details of these studies will be provided during the 58th ITTC Session and/or to the CEM. This activity is expected to continue into 2023 and beyond.

The IMM 2021 and 2022 Work Plans were approved as a part of the IMM Progress Reports for 2020 and 2021 that were submitted to the EU in December 2020 and 2021, respectively. As the IMM project is scheduled to complete activities in December 2022, the focus of the Work Plan for the year has shifted towards activities under Result 3 "A long-term strategy for sustaining the Independent Market Monitoring system beyond this project is defined in consultation with the EU and VPA partner countries". Feedback from trade and FLEGT/EUTR Competent Authorities in key EU countries is also being sought as a part of the annual IMM survey. From among the remaining VPA partner countries, IMM will also consult stakeholders in Ghana and Viet Nam, which are widely considered most likely to be the next countries to start FLEGT-licensing in the foreseeable future. ITTO website:

The ITTO website has been updated regularly during the biennium with a wide-range of information on ITTO's work, including news; calls for proposals; information for the International Tropical Timber Council and its committees; publications, including the TFU and the Policy Development and Technical series; a statistical database; the Biennial Review of the World Timber Situation; the Market Information Service; information on the ITTO Fellowship Programme; vacancies; forthcoming events; project work (with a comprehensive search engine); a photo gallery; and quick links to various areas of the site. New or modified sections or pages on the site during the biennium include: ITTO contact points; Council's advisory bodies/groups; projects/concept notes for donor consideration; the Sustainable Development Goals; and Learning materials.

Social media:

ITTO has a longstanding presence on Facebook, Instagram, LinkedIn, Twitter and YouTube. Regular postings have been made across all social media accounts during the biennium. Key data on social media are included in the Organization's annual reports.

Videos:

At the time of preparation of this report, a total of 122 videos were available on ITTO's YouTube channel, showing various aspects of the Organization's work.

Promotional materials:

At the time of preparation of this report, the monthly e-newsletter *Tropical Forest News* had around 2,700 subscribers. Twelve issues were distributed in 2021 and 9 (to date) in 2022.

Annual report and project/activity reports:

The 2020 ITTO annual report was published on the website in August 2021. French, and Spanish editions were posted in September 2021. The annual report for 2021 has been published on the ITTO website in September 2022. The translation into French and Spanish is ongoing. Three Technical Series publications were published in 2021: Fiscal and Non-fiscal Incentives for Sustainable Forest Management, Tropical Timber 2050; and Not Only Timber, the latter funded through a MoU signed with the Precious Forest Foundation in January 2021 amounting to USD 11.000. The Biennial Review of the World Timber Situation

2019–2020 was published in August 2021. Two more technical reports are under production and expected to be released before the end of 2022.

Two policy briefs were published in 2022: Improving Outcomes for Biodiversity and People and Lessons for Working Well Together in African Forests.

Other reports published during the biennium, include: Forest Product Conversion Factors: Tropical Logs and Sawnwood in June 2021;

Designing Fiscal Instruments for Sustainable Forestry in April 2021 (a publication by the Climate Investment Funds and the World Bank with ITTO support) in April 2021; India Timber Supply and Demand 2010–2030, in September 2021; A new national policy for the Peruvian forest, in June 2022 and Teak in the Mekong for a Sustainable Future, in September 2022.

ITTO was featured in a chapter of *A Better World, Volume 7*, published by the Human Development Forum in March 2021, showcasing ITTO's work related to SDG 17.

Links to newsletters produced under an ITTO project to develop teak resources in the Mekong Subregion were disseminated through ITTO's website and other media.

Public relations:

Most PR events planned for 2021 were either cancelled or postponed due to the pandemic.
