Brief introduction

The cross-cutting aspects of the root causes and impacts of the wildfires, along with the complexity and uncertainty they bring, demand robust institutions and their articulation mechanisms, strong commitment from stakeholders, innovative and encompassing tools of communication and engagement, all supported by the best scientific knowledge in risk assessment and evaluation. We must also acknowledge the importance of revitalizing traditional fire management techniques, which have historically provided sustainable solutions for fire management and contributed to food security.

Background

Each year, approximately 340-370 million hectares of land are affected by wildland fires. To combat this, a shift from reactive responses to proactive, prevention-focused measures through Integrated Fire Management is essential. In May 2023, FAO and UNEP launched the Fire Hub at the 8th International Wildland Fire Conference to enhance countries' capacities in implementing these strategies, aiming to reduce the adverse impacts of wildfires on livelihoods, landscapes, and the global climate.

A key pillar of the Fire Hub is promoting wildfire-resilient communities through technological and social innovations, integrating scientific advancements, technology, and local and





traditional knowledge. This event aims to explore innovative solutions and collaborative efforts in managing fires more effectively and sustainably. It will provide background on the Fire Hub, its progress so far, and offer a platform for discussion among stakeholders, including governments, organizations, Indigenous Peoples, and other local knowledge holders, to define a path towards better Integrated Fire Management globally.

This session aims to:

- Bring together key partners of the Global Fire Management Hub (Fire Hub) to discuss the promotion and scaling up of integrated initiatives, experiences, and knowledge.
- Integrate insights from Indigenous Peoples, local knowledge holders, and scientific advancements into fire management strategies.
- Foster collaboration and share best practices to enhance global wildfire resilience and reduce the negative impacts of wildfires on communities and the environment.
