



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PREFACE

Bamboo Products Training Course No (3) was organized by project PD 146/02 Rev 1 (I); Promoting Sustainable Utilization of Bamboo through Community Participation in Sustainable Forest Management with the support of International Tropical Timber Organization (ITTO). The training course was conducted at the Forest Research Institute (FRI), Yezin of the Forest Department. Ministry of Forestry Jointly supported the training.

The objective of the training course was to encourage the trainees to utilize the bamboo with the up to date technique and value-added bamboo products.

The training course was conducted at the (FRI) during 15-24 August 2005. There were 27 participants who have some experiences and interest in bamboo weaving and curtain making. Most of them are local communities from the three project sites in Pyinmana, Kawhmu and, Paukkaung Township and some from (FRI), Forest Department were also included.

The training course committee was established on the of August, 2005 and chairman and co-chairman were U Saw Eh Dah, Coordinator of the project PD 146/02 Rev1 (I) and U Htun Paw Oo, National Project Manager of the ITTO Bamboo Project. Members of the committee were U Thaung Nyunt, Deputy Director, Forest Research Institute, U Sein Thet, National Consultant of Bamboo Project and Daw Khin May Lwin, Deputy Project Manager (2) of the Project and the Secretary of the Committee was U Khin Maung Oo, Deputy Project Manager (3). Other Project staff, which included for facilitating the training were U Aung Soe, U Tint Khaing, U Min Thu, Daw Ni Ni Thin and Daw Mu Mu Aung.

The opening ceremony was presided by U Htun Paw Oo Director of Forest Research Institute, (FRI), Forest Department, Ministry of Forestry.

All the 27 trainees passed the evaluation standard after 10 days of intensive training. The criteria for the evaluation included standard test table, interest and outcomes of their practical works.

Training Procedure

Curriculum

The training course consists of lectures and practical works. The practical works were divided into 2 sessions, session (I) bamboo weaving and making of bamboo purse, session (II) bamboo curtain making session. The groups were not interchanged so that each group attended only one session.

Bamboo weaving and making of bamboo purse and hat

The curriculum for training covers species selection and suitable age for slicing, weaving and designing for finished products such as bamboo purse, bamboo hat. Daw Khin May Lwin, Deputy National Project Manager, leader of bamboo processing section conducted the pre-treatment like preservative treatment method, drying method and sewing the bamboo purse and bamboo hat. U Tin Win, U Thein Soe and Daw San Myint from Mingladone Township conducted the bamboo weaving.

Bamboo Curtain

The curriculum covers species selection and suitable age for curtain and designing for curtain, Daw Mai Khin Than & Daw Mai Khin Pu from Yezin, Pyinmana Township conducted the training.




Figure (1) Classification of Trainees by Sex




Figure (2) Classification of Trainees by Age




Figure (3) Classification of Trainees by Division




Figure (4) Classification of Trainees by their Major Source of Income




Figure (5) Bar Chart Showing the Training Evaluation Results.

It is also expected that the trainees will transfer their experiences to their peers for their own benefit. It is suggested that:


- 1. There should be adequate time for each subject to be trained in future trainings.

- 4. To produce high quality of bamboo products, which are easy to transport meet the local and foreign market should be encouraged.


